Zane Grey's 'The Border Legion' Coming to the Arcade.

A romance of the 'Old West' lives again in Zane Grey's 'The Border Legion,' a Paramount picture with featured cast headed by Antonio Moreno and Helene Chadwick, which opens July 17 at the Arcade.

Moreno, as a cowpuncher, is in love with a beautiful daughter of the West, played by Helene Chadwick—so much so, in fact, that he neglects his work to visit her and is discharged by Charles Ogle playing the part of cattle owner. The girl taunts Moreno and he rides away to join 'The Border Legion,' a band of conscienceless outlaws headed by Rockiff Fellowes and Gibson Gowland.

Later the girl repents and takes Ogle to ride with her to find Moreno and bring him back. They are intercepted by Fellowes who kills Ogle and steals the girl. In the lonely cabin where she is Fellowes' prisoner, the girl is found by Moreno when he comes to join The Legion. They plan to escape but are frustrated. Moreno finds a wandering preacher and he and the girl are married, she leaning from the window of her bedroom prison.

The Legion goes to raid a gold camp but is betrayed. Fellowes, Gowland and two other bandits alone escape from a street fight during which Moreno has rescued the girl and is fleeing with her on the gold coach. The remnants of the band hold up the coach, wound Moreno and again capture the girl.

In a game of cards in another cabin, the girl is won by Gowland, but at the crucial moment Moreno staggers in and stands swaying in the doorway. Then ensues one of the most dramatic points in the picture, in a scene fraught with stirring action. William Howard is director.
