Complimented Upon Quality of Better Homes Demonstration.

Cottage Grove has been distinguished by being named as second of 19 cities to receive honorable mention for the comprehensiveness and success of its participation in the recent national better homes week.

Over 750 communities participated, many of them being larger than Cottage Grove. Three prizes were awarded to cities of above 10,000 population and three to cities under 10,000. The honorable mentions were regardless of size.

In a letter from national headquarters to Mrs. Herman Edwards, president of the Elks club, which had charge of the campaign locally, it is stated that the national campaign this year was larger than ever before. The national committee was impressed with the comprehensiveness and educational value of the general program held in Cottage Grove.
