Auvergne Hills Traced to Volcanic Upheavals

Although the hills of Auvergne in France do not rise to the altitude of the Alps or the Pyrenees, they have peculiar characteristics of their own. They were born and molded amid great volcanic upheavals. The ice king may govern the glaciers, but here the fire king has reigned, says the Springfield Republican.
The Monts-Dome are one long chain of linked volcanoes, now as dead as the mountains in the moon. Nearly sixty gaping craters may still be counted. Even the Monts Dore and the Cantal hills, whose cone-shaped summits, the highest in Auvergne, stand out so impressively in the distance, are but the time-worn ruins of huge volcanoes.
All the country round about bears lasting traces of its dramatic past; beds of lava hidden by the fresh green turf; dark pillars, like the famous "Orgues de Bort"; giants' causeways; odd dikes that might be dusky Druid stones; "sucs" and "pays" that might be the pustules of a fever-stricken earth—such are the features which give this central region a strange individuality that has been further intensified by the hand of man.

Twelfth Night Customs Kept Up in England

Many strange and curious rites and customs have long been connected with the observance of Twelfth night. Twelfth night is the evening before Epiphany, the 6th of January, also called Twelfth-tide and Old Christmas day.
In England the principal rite of the evening is the cutting of the "bean cake"—a cake in which a bean is cooked, the finder of which is made the king of the night and the following day.
It was in commemoration of this custom that Robert Baddely an English comedian of the eighteenth century, who was long a favorite at the Drury Lane theater, made one of the strangest bequests on record.
Baddely died in 1794, and in his will he bequeathed his cottage to a theatrical fund, requesting that a sum of three pounds be annually expended on a cake, to be cut on Twelfth night, in the Green room of the Drury Lane theater, and divided among the actors and actresses.

Great Naval Station

Malta has an area of 118 square miles and a population of 224,680. This includes the neighboring islands of Gozo and Comino. Malta was annexed to Great Britain, with the free will of the Maltese, in 1814 by the treaty of Paris. It has an elected legislature, but there are certain reserved matters, such as war, treaties, foreign trade, etc., which are dealt with by the governor and executive council. Exports include potatoes and other vegetables, oranges, cumin seed, goats and sheep, cotton goods and stone. The distance of Malta from New York is about 4,300 miles. This group of islands is situated in the Mediterranean sea, 90 miles from Sicily, 140 miles from the European mainland and 180 miles from Africa. It has a magnificent harbor at Valletta and an ideal situation as a coaling station and center of Mediterranean commerce. It is England's premier naval station in that sea.

River "Rafts" Nuisances

One of the most remarkable of the Mississippi rafts began forming in the Atchafalaya, a lower arm of the river, in 1778. By 1810 it had become 10 miles long, more than 600 feet in width, about eight feet deep, and had become solid enough to support a growth of trees, some of which were 60 feet in height. Finally the state of Louisiana had to remove the obstruction at great expense, the work occupying four years.
The United States government has since that time removed a raft which blocked the channel of the Red river for 45 miles.

The law of average is an economic law which aims to demonstrate that while the trend of human affairs cannot be forecast with certainty, it can be worked out to a considerable extent arithmetically by arriving at averages based on statistics relating to the event. This practice has long been employed in business and is gradually being adopted in the professions. An important example of its use is the elaborate system of tables prepared by life insurance companies.

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Good Things to Eat

IT IS hard for the busy mother, who has everything to do, to find time to vary her cookery by garnishing or variety in combinations when expense is one of the all-important items, which it is in most households.
Some time when the children are clamoring for cinnamon rolls try making them with a baking powder biscuit dough, rich enough to be wholesome and digestible. Roll out, spread with butter and sprinkle thickly with cinnamon, brown sugar and raisins or currants. Roll up and cut into half-inch biscuits by slicing with a sharp knife. Bake in a hot oven and serve hot.

When making bread or rolls, the sponge used for cinnamon rolls makes a more palatable roll.
Turkish Rolls.—Work one-fourth of a cupful of almond paste into one cupful of boiled, cooled water, add a tablespoonful of butter, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one cake of compressed yeast, softened in one-fourth of a cupful of lukewarm water, and add three or four cupfuls of flour. Mix all together and knead to a soft dough. Let stand in a warm place to double its bulk. Shape into rolls. When light, brush over with milk and bake in a hot oven.

Cup Cakes.—Take one-third cupful of shortening, add one cupful of sugar, creaming the mixture well. Add two eggs well beaten, one and two-thirds cupful of pastry flour sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder; alternate the flour with one-half cupful of milk, beating the batter well. Bake in gem pans and frost with:
Seven-Minute Frosting.—Put one egg white, unbeaten, seven-eighths of a cupful of sugar, three tablespoonfuls of water over rapidly boiling water. Begin to beat immediately with a Dover egg beater and beat constantly for seven minutes. Remove from the heat and add a teaspoonful of vanilla and twelve marshmallows cut into small pieces. Beat until the marshmallows are dissolved, then spread on the cakes.
