TREE SPRAYS DESCRIBED

Codling Moth and Apple Tree Disease Poison Formulas Given.

Spray formulas for combating the codling moth and anthracnose, a disease of the apple tree, have been given by C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector. The sprays should be applied without a moment's delay, he states.

Codling moths are attacking apple and pear trees and the new ones now appearing are of the second brood. Poison for the moths may be prepared by mixing two pounds of lead arsenate with 100 gallons of water. This spray should be applied to the entire tree, including the bark.

To combat the apple tree disease the moth spray should be used in conjunction with a spray of 4-4-50 Bordeaux mixture. In this case also the bark should be thoroughly sprayed.
