THE GUARD ON ENGLISH.

The purist of journalism, the
Cottage Grove Sentinel, prints this:
"The Eugene Guard and The Har-
rier Review found 'proceocious'
used in our columns. In the spell-
ing of the word The Sentinel
could have used an 'e' out of
'proceedure', a word that appeared
in The Guard during the past week.
That even the score with The
Guard for the nonce." True
enough; quite so. But if memory
serves aright The Sentinel's use
of "proceocious" (which, singularly
enough, rhymes with atrocious) was
in the form of an editorial com-
menting on the fact that although
"proceocious" was a word often
used, the editor had scoured all
the dictionaries in Cottage Grove
for it, with complete lack of suc-
cess. We can alibi "proceedure"
as a typographical error. Can
The Sentinel do as much for "pro-
ceocious"—Eugene Guard.

The Sentinel regrets that the
usually reliable and always highly
esteemed Guard should demonstrate
such a faulty memory. Our files
are open and, if The Guard will
find where The Sentinel said what
The Guard attempts to quote it as
having said, we shall try to
prove that "proceocious" and
"atrocious" do not rhyme. The
misspelled word was used, as The
Guard may learn by consulting its
own files, in an editorial squib
complimenting The Guard under
its present management.

We dislike very much to take
advantage of The Guard this way,
but it seems to us it takes a stretch
of the imagination to alibi "pro-
ceedure" as a typographical error.
In the sense in which the expres-
sion is generally used, it refers only
to unwitting errors. Spelling it
"proceedure" is too common an
error to be thus defended. In fact,

rors made after copy is sent to the
printer, then both "proceedure" and
"proceocious" may be thus
labeled and alibied.

Plains to Oregon in 1852.

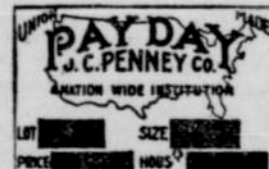

Pigeons Fly Far
Up to the year 1913, 800 miles
was the record distance flown by
any homing pigeon, but in that year
a flight was organized between
Rome and Derby, and a bird be-

Important Drugs Listed
In Kansas, a health jury has list-
ed the 10 most important and use-
ful drugs to be kept in the house-
hold first aid kit, as follows: Tinc-
ture of iodin, aromatic spirits of
ammonia, aspirin tablets, milk of
magnesia, boric acid, epsom salts,
castor oil, zinc oxide adhesive plas-
ter, peroxide of hydrogen, sodium
bicarbonate, glycerin, alkaline an-
tiseptic solution, sirup of ipecac,
powdered mustard, spirits of tur-
pentine and olive oil.
