## HARDWARE FIRM MOVES INTO ITS NEW QUARTERS

Old Arcade Theater Building Is Remodeled to House Darby & Liston Store.

Darby & Liston have completed moving their stock of hardware from the building they occupied for a number of years to the new home of the firm in the old Arcade theater building. This building, which was purchased by the company, has been completely remodeled and is one of the most up to date store buildings in the city.

Sky lights have been built to light the balcony and the lower floor. The balcony, which is reached by a wide stairway, will be devoted to household articles and goods in woman's realm.

The lower floor will be used for display of general hardware, the stock shelves being in the rear of the building. The large basement will be used for a store room.

The business office will occupy space in the center of the lower floor immediately in front of the stairway. All fixtures are of late type and the lighting system was especially designed for the store.

The front of the building has also been remodeled and windows built for display purposes. A space near the entrance will be devoted to sporting goods.

The building vacated by Darby & Liston will be occupied by the furniture firm of Bressler & Son.
