figures that may help inquirers to form their own conclusions. They concern recent graduates of Yale. Four of five men getting highest honors in the academic department were self-supporting. All of the five graduated "with high praise" from the scientific school were self-supporting. So were more than half of the 212 under-graduate honor students.

Here is ample evidence that men can and do work their way through one of the best known colleges in America. Many another college, east and west, north and south, will probably tell a similar story. Then is it good for them? Obviously the self-supporters do not suffer in scholarship, at least, compared with the others. Probably the very effort to make their own way makes them take the college work more seriously, so that they get more out of their educational opportunities than those to whom the college course comes as a gift.

Records show, too, that these earnest students are likely to be leaders in college activities, and that there is seldom any serious social discrimination against them because of the work they do for a living. Their combined course of study and self support makes the transition from college to "practical life" in the outer world easier for them than for the others.

Yet some of these students are found to work too hard, impairing their health and prospects. In general, earning all his own expenses may be said to be too hard a strain on the student. But it seems good for almost any student to earn some of his college expenses.—St. Helens Misc.
