RUMOR OF BIG TIMBEE DEAL IS DENIED

Southern Lumber Operators Plan To Come to Northwest.

Denial that the sale or merger of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company's interests was contemplated was made in Eugene last week by R. A. Booth, vice president of the company. His statement set at rest rumors which had been prevalent in lumber circles for two weeks that southern lumbermen might take over the holdings of the company. Several lumber operators of the south are interested in the fir industry of Lane county and the northwest and contemplate operating here, Mr. Booth said.

Representatives of several southern companies have inspected mills of the northwest recently and lumbermen and bankers predict that some of these operators will enter the field in the northwest in the near future.

Increased use of fir in the manufacture of sash and door products and depletion of the pine supply of the south are said to be the reasons for the interest shown in this section by the pine lumber manufacturers.

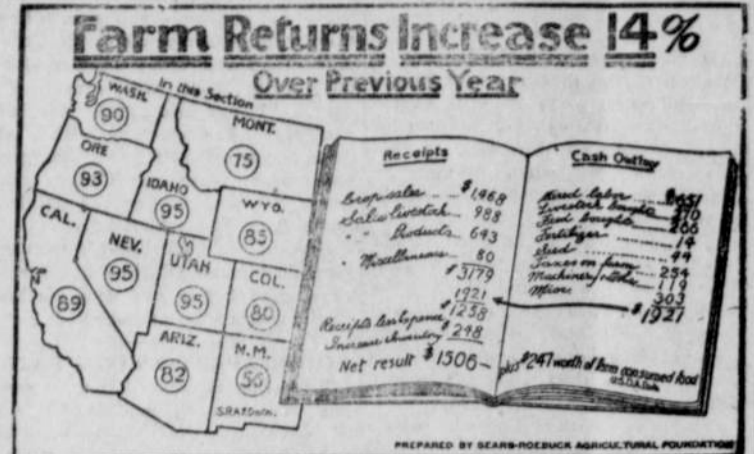
MUCH PYROTOL SOLD TO LANE FARMERS

County Agent Receiving Orders For New Shipment of Powder.

The third shipment of pyrotol to be brought to Lane county since August 20 by O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, was distributed from Junction City last week. The car contained 16,000 pounds of the explosive and was distributed among 49 purchasers. Another carload of 22,850 pounds is expected this week. Mr. Fletcher is pooling orders

for another carload, to be shipped to Eugene. The explosive will cost 8.31 cents per pound, f. o. b. Eugene. Orders have been received from more than 30 farmers and the county court has ordered 19,550 pounds. This pool will be closed October 9.

A CROSS-SECTION view of the mental and pocket-book status of the agricultural industry is shown above. On the state map is recorded the number indicating the average moral index of the farmers in that state with 100 as normal, as set by hundreds of farmers themselves who serve as field observers for the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. On the farm account book is detailed the average of the receipts, cash outlay, and net results of the farming operations on hundreds of farms as reported by farmers to the United States Department of Agriculture.

Last year the cash receipts of the average farm in the territory pictured above from the sale of crops, livestock, and live stock products totaled \$3,179. After cash expenditures for hired help, feed, seed, taxes, etc., amounting to \$1,921 had been deducted, the farmer had left a cash balance of \$1,258 for the year's work of himself and family. His complete return for the year, however, was \$1,506 for his inventory increased \$248 during the twelve months. This figure does not include \$367 worth of home raised food which the farm family consumed.

"A comparison of last year's farm return with the year before will give a true picture of improving conditions," states the Foundation, after studying the wonderful data compiled by the Department of Agriculture. The total receipts of the average farm in the western states in 1923 totaled \$2,870, and while the cash outlay averaged \$1,880, the difference between cash receipts and cash expenditures was only \$1,040 in 1923 as against \$1,258 for last year's work—a 14 per cent increase. For the United States as a whole the average return of each farm was \$1,205 last year, \$1,020 the year before and only \$917 in 1922. This definitely indicates that the farmer's income is coming up steadily, and that it cannot be long before he will be himself financially again.
