CITY IS WITHOUT LIGHTS DURING STORM

Lightning Fires Tree Near Derrick Of Guaranty Oil Company.

The city was without lights and electrical power for a short time Tuesday afternoon as the result of an electrical storm which visited this section. Lightning burned out three 11,000-volt bushings and one primary lead in a transformer at Tenth and Madison streets. Employees of the Mountain States Power company repaired the damage in a short time.

A bolt of lightning struck a large fir tree on Mount David a few hundred yards west of the derrick of the Guaranty Oil company, splintering the limbs and setting the tree afire.

A heavy downpour of rain followed the electrical display.

County Gets Motor Fund.

Lane county will receive \$14,800.94 as its share of money received by the motor vehicle department of the state. The total collected by the state was \$1,201,183.88 and \$267,500 was apportioned to counties. This is the apportionment from March 15 to September 15. Lane county is next to Multnomah in money received, Marion county ranking third.

Cottage Grove graduated from the village mail delivery class to city delivery class this morning. The change was made quietly and smoothly at the postoffice and delivery was made on schedule. Postmaster Smith said. The new rural route on Mosby creek, which will extend to the Perini bridge, will go into effect October 5.

Fined for Liquor Violations.

The city treasury was enriched \$125 by fines imposed Monday afternoon by Police Judge Galloway for violations of the prohibition law. Ed Vendon contributed \$50 upon two complaints, Gus Modell contributed \$30 and Olaf Hammer \$20. The first two were also charged with disorderly conduct but Hammer was not.

Auto License Rate Cut.

Automobile owners may purchase state licenses for the three remaining months of the year for one fourth the regular rate, beginning today. The half rate has been in effect since July 1. A large number of applicants for temporary licenses have already been made at the office of Frank E. Taylor, sheriff.

Radio Tests Set.

Federal examinations for all classes of radio operator licenses will be held in the Eugene post-office building tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock. Applicants should take pencils, pens, ink and necessary drawing materials.

Booker's Condition Critical.

The condition of Louis Booker, Cottage Grove young man who was accidentally shot by his own gun September 24 and who has been in a Eugene hospital since, has become critical. Members of his family were called to Eugene today to be with him.

Mr. Miller was born April 5, 1905, at Innisfail, Alberta, Canada, and had made his home here for two years with his aunt, Mrs. Christina Richardson. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Miller and a sister, Grace, of Innisfail, and a brother Frank, of this city.

The parents and sister have arrived for the funeral.
