### LLOYD IS CONVICTED ON MURDER CHARGE

Slayer of Independence Driver To Be Sentenced Saturday.

A verdict of guilty of first degree murder was returned last night by a jury in Dallas in the case of W. R. Lloyd, Cottage Grove man accused of slaying Clinton I. Baun, Independence for hire car driver September 1. No recommendation for leniency was made.

Seven members of the grand jury that indicted Lloyd were called by the state at the trial. They testified that Lloyd had confessed slaying Baun. On the witness stand Lloyd pleaded lapse of memory, saying he could not remember attacking Baun. He also denied making a confession to Wasco county officials.

The court fixed Saturday, October 10, at 9 a. m. as the time for passing sentence.

Car Owners Negligent.

Only about 15 per cent of Lane county automobile owners have had their headlights adjusted in compliance with the new state law, it is reported. Figures show the percentage in other counties is higher. The county has 14 official adjusting stations and practically all of them report they are able to make all adjustments as fast as they come in.

Census to Be Taken.

Census of all children in Lane county between the ages of four and twenty will be taken the latter part of this month and blanks for this purpose are being sent out by the county superintendent to the clerk of each district. State and county school funds will be apportioned on the basis of the figures to be compiled.

**NEW GRIDIRON IS TO BE NAMED FOR LATE WAR HERO**

Delbert Kelly Athletic Field Is To Be Dedicated at Football Game October 16.

Friday, October 16, will be the biggest day in the history of local high school sports. Eugene high will be here for a football game and upon the same occasion the new Tenth street athletic field will be dedicated. At the chamber of commerce meeting Tuesday the name of Delbert Kelly was given the field. Kelly was one of two lads from here to lose their lives on the battlefield during the world war. The other was Calvin T. Funk, for whom the local American Legion post was named.

The new athletic field has been secured through the efforts of the chamber of commerce, the property being secured by payment of the amount of taxes charged against it. The chamber at first contemplated only holding the property until the school district could make arrangements to purchase it. Whether this plan will be followed has not been definitely decided.

All business houses of the city will be asked to close their places at 2 o'clock on Friday and to keep closed until 5 o'clock, so that business men and clerks can attend the game and the dedication exercises. S. L. Mackin is in charge of a committee that is arranging a short program.

The lineup of the local eleven probably will be announced following the game Saturday with Oakland. The team has made rapid progress since the first game with the alumni and Coach Grannis expects to make a good showing. A large number from Eugene will come here for the game, it is reported.
