Leather Retains Strength That leather of good quality kept for ten years, under ordinary conditions, does not lose more than 15 per cent of its strength was shown by experiments of the bureau of standards. Belting stored in the laboratory for a decade was found to be only slightly weaker than new material of the same grade, indicating that articles made from it would be preserved for an indefinite period if subjected to normal atmosphere, ventilation and light, while dampness and sunlight appear to have a harmful effect on the leather. It is believed the results of the studies will enable manufacturers of shoes, luggage and similar goods to alter shipping and storage practices, since such articles may be capable of many years of service even though they might not reach the user until one to three years after they are made.—Exchange.

His Lambs On the occasion of a special service at a village church the vicar of a large London parish was persuaded to preach. The congregation was naturally an agricultural one.
