their own rifles, and some the arms issued by the state of Oregon.

On the morning of July 6 the command marched south from Pilot Rock towards the scene of attack on the settlers of Camas Prairie, to see if any survivors remained and also to scout for traces of the foe. By noon they had reached a place known as Willow Springs, where there was an abandoned sheep ranch beside a fine spring of water, the source of Birch creek, and also of Butter creek, we are informed.

Here the men were told to dismount and prepare whatever feed they had with them; some were eating, some were finished and had mounted, while the horses of the dismounted men were in a corral, or standing about the scene. Dr. Oglesby had suggested that scouts be thrown out, and this was done as suggested. One Indian had been seen with field glasses, but no other hostiles had as yet been sighted. A detachment was being formed to ride to Camas Prairie to perform the duty assigned to the force, and as they were preparing for their departure outside the ranch buildings, a tumbled down house and shed, with a pippen of logs and a pile of posts nearby, a volley of rifle shots from the surrounding hills apprised them that the Indians had taken the fight to the whites, and the war was on.

The attack affected men variously; some rushed to the shelter of the houses and returned the fire of the foe; some fired from their positions outside the buildings, while some, be it sorrowfully admitted, abandoned their comrades to shift for themselves, wounded and well, and galloped helter skelter for Pilot Rock, which all the men so headed reached safely. It may be chalked up to their credit, however, that

they dispatched aid for the remainder of the command.

The firing of the Indians from the ridges about the canyon where the white men were besieged became heavier constantly, and the reply of the beleaguered was in no whit lagging, but was, however, carefully directed; cartridges were too precious to waste unless a good sight was had of a dusky antagonist. The horses seemed to be the initial object of the Indians, and with whoops to stampee them, and bullets to kill or disable them, they strove to "set the whites afoot" as was the constant attempt during all Indian wars where horses figured to any great extent. Most of the horses were killed, wounded or stampee thus. (To be concluded next Monday.)
