COTTAGE GROVE MEN TO GO TO ELKTON HEARING

State Highway Body to Hear Plans For Formation of Umpqua Road District.

Members of the state highway commission will meet in Elkton Thursday to discuss formation of the proposed super highway district, the purpose of which would be to improve and complete the Umpqua highway from Drain to Reedsport and secure completion of the Roosevelt highway across the western end of Coos county. Cottage Grove has taken an active interest in the project since it was first suggested and a delegation from this city will attend the meeting.

Organization of a caravan from here will be discussed tomorrow at the regular luncheon of the chamber of commerce. At a meeting held near Scottsburg August 23 the Cottage Grove delegation outnumbered those of all other communities. Plans for Thursday's hearing were laid at this first meeting.

Considerable enthusiasm has been aroused in Drain and Reedsport and large delegations from each community will attend the hearing. These two cities will benefit directly if the proposed district becomes a reality. Completion of the Umpqua highway would afford residents of the coast section a much shorter route to the Pacific highway than any now existing, shortening the trip from the coast to Portland by many miles. The route is said to be the shortest and most feasible of any south of Salem. The value of opening up the fertile Umpqua country and bringing within reach of the tourist some of the finest scenery in Oregon will be stressed before the highway commission.

Fifty residents of Drain met last week to organize a caravan to attend the hearing. At this meeting it was stated some opposition to the project had developed, but it was said these persons had been misinformed concerning the taxation necessary to make possible the project.

The state highway commission, the bureau of public roads and Douglas county have agreed that if the proposed district is formed and \$150,000 raised they will furnish the additional money necessary to complete the Umpqua highway and the link in the Roosevelt highway. The share to be contributed by the district is estimated at about 20 per cent. Valuation of the property in the district is \$5,000,000 and the tax necessary to raise the \$150,000 would be ten mills for three years. Sponsors of the plan state that by putting up \$150,000 with the privilege of paying in three years the district can have a highway constructed by the state and the United States bureau of public roads and will have to pay but a fifth the cost. A further point stressed in the appeal for support is that taxpayers will get \$100 worth of road work for only \$20.

Federal mileage to be allotted to this state is something in excess of 100 miles and backers of the project hope to secure a part of this in the event the district votes to tax itself. The plan under which the district is to be formed provides for the election of seven trustees who have the power to assess the district the required ten mills for three years.

STREAMS STOCKED WITH RAINBOW TROUT

Local Rod and Gun Club Members Release 105,000 Minnows.

Local disciples of Izaak Walton need have no fear of depletion of the trout supply while the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club is active in restocking streams of this part of the country. Saturday members of the club planted 105,000 rainbow trout fingerlings in various streams.

The fish were placed in Little river, Mosby creek, tributaries of Row river and tributaries and headwaters of the Sinslaw river. The minnows were brought here by special equipped trucks from the state hatchery on the McKenzie river. This is the second shipment to be received this year by the local club.

Change Made in Athletics.
