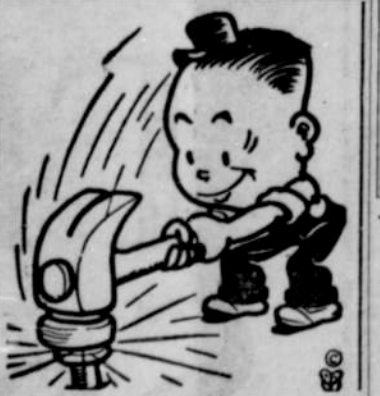
Road to Be Completed.
