NORTHWEST LEADS U. S. IN LUMBER CUT

Oregon Ranks Next to Washington in Government Figures.

Washington first and Oregon second in lumber cut for 1924, is shown in detailed figures recently received by the district forester's office in Portland. The figures were compiled by the United States department of commerce in cooperation with the forest service, department of agriculture.

For the entire United States the lumber cut was 35,939,935,000 feet, or 3.3 per cent less than for 1923. Of 29 states, each of which reported the production of more than 150,000,000 feet of lumber in 1924, 19 showed a smaller cut than for 1923. This decrease was shared by all producing regions of the United States. Yellow pine and Douglas fir lead all species, constituting 34.7 and 20.8 per cent respectively.

Washington's total lumber cut for 1924 was 6,267,343,000 feet, board measure, and is a 6.1 per cent decrease from 1923, while Oregon cut 3,665,547,000 feet which was 7.6 per cent less than her 1923 cut. In 1924 there were 469 mills in Washington reporting, which is 161 less than reported for 1923, and 398 in Oregon, which is 61 less than reported for 1923.

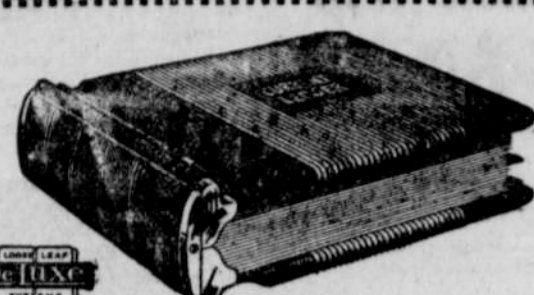

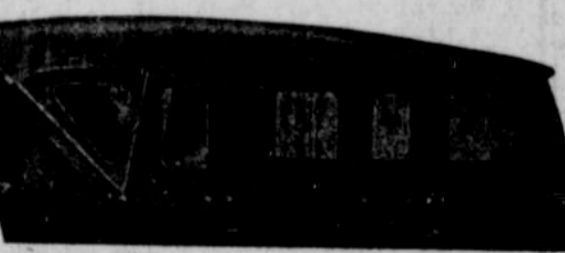
