SUMMONS.

In the circuit court of the state of Oregon, for Lane county, suit in equity.

Sherman L. Godard and Ina M. Godard, his wife, plaintiff, vs. E. J. Foster and First National bank, of Cottage Grove, a corporation, defendants.

To E. J. Foster, defendant: In the name of the state of Oregon, you and each of you are hereby summoned and required to appear and answer the complaint of plaintiffs in the above entitled suit on or before the last day of the time prescribed in the order for publication of summons hereinafter referred to, to-wit: on or before November 10th, 1925, and you are hereby notified that if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof, the plaintiffs will apply to the above entitled court for the relief prayed for in the complaint viz: for a decree of strict foreclosure of that certain land sale contract executed by you on the 6th day of November, 1924, covering the following described real property to-wit:

Beginning at a point in section thirty-three (33) township twenty (20) south of range three (3) west nine and one-third (9 1/3) chains north and three and one-fourth (3 1/4) chains east and twenty (20) feet north of the southwest corner of the William Shields donation land claim number 56, thence east fifty (50) feet thence north one hundred (100) feet thence west fifty (50) feet thence south one hundred (100) feet to the place of beginning in Lane county, state of Oregon.
