NEW CHURCH IS PLANNED BY BAPTISTS

Modern Fireproof Building to Cost Not Less Than \$10,000.

Construction in Cottage Grove of a modern church, to cost not less than \$10,000, probably will be under way by Christmas, according to J. D. Chappelle of the American Baptist Home Mission society of New York, who is in charge of the chapel car in which the local Baptist congregation is meeting until the new church can be built on property owned by the church on Fifth street opposite the high school.

An architect is busy on plans and calls for bids will be issued soon, it was stated. The building will be of fireproof construction.

Regular services are being conducted in the chapel car "Good Will," located on the Southern Pacific tracks north of the station. J. C. Orr is pastor of the local church.
