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OUR IMPENDING STATE DEFICIT.

(Eugene Daily Guard.)
The Oregon Voter, whose editor has a flair for figures and whose figuring generally turns out to be sound, is publishing in its current edition of this week a comprehensive article analyzing the situation affecting state revenues and prospects for the coming year. The writer makes a tabulation indicating that the deficit for the 1925-1926 biennium will total \$885,858. He estimates receipts at \$14,917,210; appropriations and millage taxes as \$15,917,210.

There has been assumption by some that the state will be forced upon a warrant basis soon after the beginning of 1926, because of the suspension under referendum petitions of the special revenue-producing laws enacted by the last legislature. The Oregon Voter does not think so, or at least it thinks there will be no long period on the warrant basis, "for the reason that motor vehicle license fees and gasoline tax, ultimately destined for highway work, are captured at first by the general fund and there held until the period arrives for their transfer from that fund. This accumulation into the general fund, while obligated as to its final destination, is available for cashing warrants so long as it visits in the general fund. While theoretically the funds available for general state purposes may be exhausted, use of the highway funds temporarily in the general fund may tide the state through without having to stamp warrants 'not paid for lack of funds.'"

However this phase of the matter may turn out, there will be a real deficit by the end of 1926, according to the Oregon Voter's calculation. If the cigarette tax, the truck and bus tax and the so-called titling bill are upheld under referendum they will begin to produce revenue by the opening of 1927, and may produce sufficient revenue to take care of the 1926 deficit and such state expenditures for the 1927-28 biennium as are not provided for by existing revenues. But that is all.

Thus, at best, it appears that the next legislature is going to have a problem of finance on its hands. If all or any of the special revenue measures should be defeated under the referendum there would be aggravation of the situation to that extent. The Oregon Voter thinks that defeat of them all would bring the problem to the proportions of a crisis.

The situation thus set out is of Governor Pierce's making, although the Oregon Voter makes no effort in its article to give it a political tinge or to fix responsibility. The governor and Jefferson Myers, then state treasurer, cut the tax levy a million dollars below the known revenue needs of the state. The governor procured passage by the legislature of the special revenue measures which were to have made up the deficit, but vetoed a bill which would have permitted a special election when the referendum was invoked, and thus the special revenues did not materialize. It looks as though the state is going to pay through the nose. The governor says it deserves to do so because the voters repealed the state income tax.

CAPTAIN OGLESBY'S PART AT WILLOW SPRINGS.

Cottage Grove, Ore., Nov. 10.—(To the Editor.)—Referring to the article recently published in The Sentinel about the Battle of Willow Springs during the Bannock Indian war in 1878, written by Donegan Wiggins, I wish to make a brief correction in reference to my father, the late Dr. W. W. Oglesby, and the prominent part he took in this engagement.

Dr. W. W. Oglesby was captain of company G, second regiment, third brigade, O. S. M. of Weston, at that time his home. On the evening of July 3, 1878, upon receipt of news of the Indian outbreak, Captain Oglesby and his company marched to Pendleton, a distance of 21 miles, and joined Captain Sperry and company. Captain Sperry was placed in command and together they marched to meet the foe. In the first part of the engagement which followed at Willow Springs, Captain Sperry was deposed and Captain Oglesby was declared commander. During the battle Captain Oglesby killed Chief Buffalo Horn while he was in pursuit of Scout Bill Blakely.

An interesting account of this battle was published in The Sentinel about 13 years ago.
