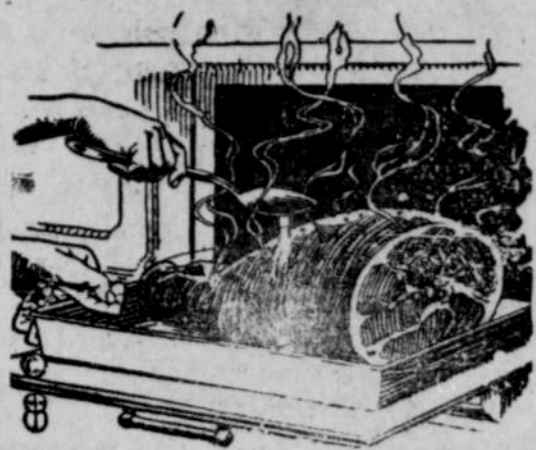

The baby was comforted and given warm clothing in place of its damp, dirty garments. Officials were notified and it was the verdict that the baby had been left purposely, its parents fleeing.

County Agent Is Busy

Activities of the office of O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent, are summarized in the following monthly report: "Received 263 office calls and 31 telephone calls in regard to farm problems; wrote 212 individual letters; mailed 1577 copies of six circular letters; visited 12 farms; traveled 574 miles by automobile; specialists from the Oregon Agricultural college cooperated a total of three days with the county agent; the county agent or cooperating specialist spoke at 5 meetings with a total attendance of 366. "Number of days devoted to various projects was as follows: organization, 5.5; rural engineering (mostly on pyrotol), 3.5; poultry, horticulture, and farm crops, 2 days each; animal husbandry and dairy husbandry, 1.5 days each; insect pest control, community activities, and miscellaneous, 1 day each."

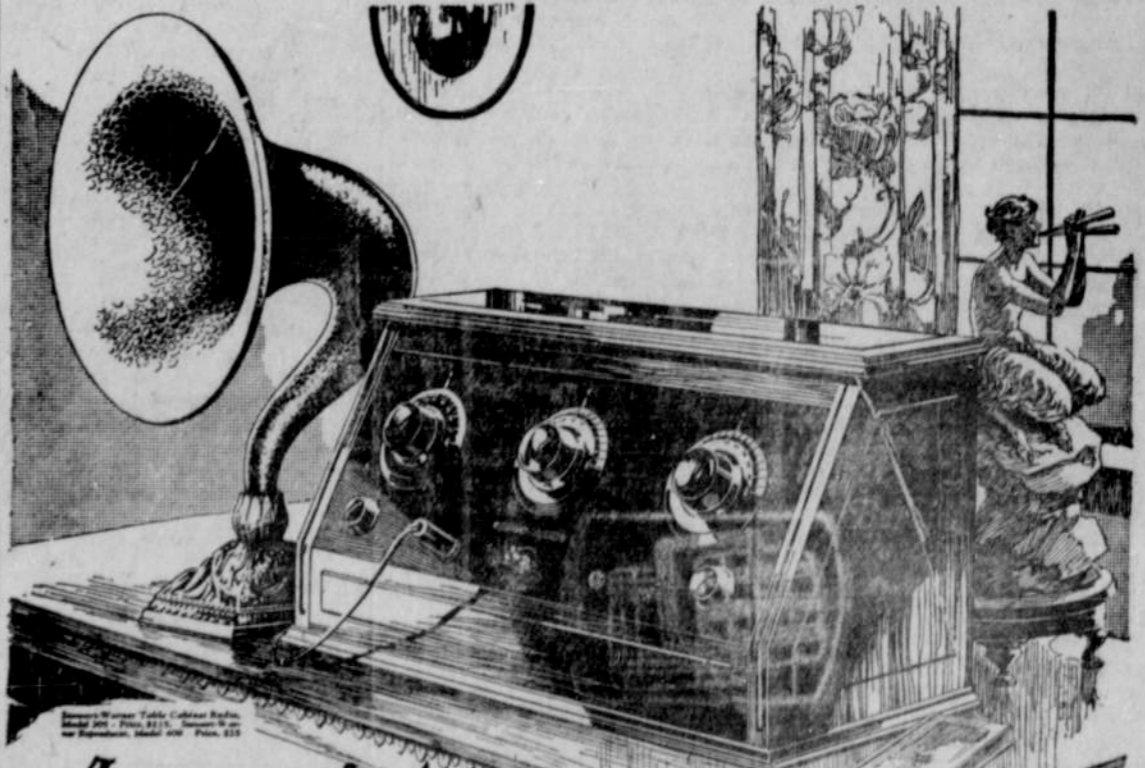
