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WOMAN, OUR SUPERIOR.

TRAFFIC OFFICER HURT IN COLLISION

E. H. Lister Crashes Head On Into Car at West Springfield.

E. H. Lister, state traffic officer for this district, was severely injured yesterday afternoon at 3:30 on the Pacific Highway at West Springfield, when the motorcycle on which he was riding crashed head on into an automobile driven by Mrs. C. E. Hopper of Tacoma. Reports from a Eugene hospital, where Mr. Lister was taken after the accident, stated he had sustained a fractured arm, a broken shoulder, a broken cheek bone and multiple cuts on the head and face. He will recover within three months unless complications set in, it was stated.

Mr. Lister was pursuing a speeding automobile and was reported to have been traveling at high speed. Mrs. Hooper was about to enter a service station and had signaled to turn to the left, she said. Lister, traveling in the opposite direction, apparently did not see the signal.

Both car and motorcycle were badly damaged.
