Nease Sues County To Collect Money

Circuit Court to Decide Long Controversy; Barnard Says Contract Not Fulfilled.

Suit to collect \$24,343.61 was filed in circuit court Friday by M. G. Nease against Lane county, finally bringing into the courts the long controversy between Mr. Nease and county court members over Nease's cruise of county timber. The figures include interest at eight per cent from August 20, 1924, the date on which Mr. Nease alleges he filed maps and records upon completion of his cruise of the timber.

Mr. Nease entered into a contract with the county court December 8, 1923, to cruise 100,000 acres of timber in Lane county the next year. The contract was signed by L. N. Roney and Emmett Sharp, who were then commissioners. County Judge C. P. Barnard refused to sign the contract.

Mr. Nease in his complaint states the cruise was made according to contract. Judge Barnard, after the suit was filed, said present members of the county court were agreed that the terms of the contract had not been fulfilled and that the county did not get the results it was entitled to.

TURKEY MARKET OPENS; BIRDS SCARCE

Buyers at Roseburg Try to Keep Price Below 43c Mark.

Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 20.—The Thanksgiving turkey market opened today, the receipts being exceptionally light. The market opened at a price of 41 cents, which quickly went to 42 cents as the birds started coming in. With the number of birds very small, competition forced the price upward to 43 cents shortly before 10 a. m., but it was thought probable that this price would not hold. Buyers are apparently trying to keep the price under the 43-cent mark, while growers are holding out for a better price. Only birds in prime condition are being brought in for the Thanksgiving trade, those which will put on weight between now and Christmas time being held for the holiday market.

NATIONAL HIGHWAYS TO BE DESIGNATED

Cottage Grove on Route Approved By Federal Officials.

Announcement has been made by Secretary of Agriculture Jardine of the approval of 75,884 miles of roads in the United States for designation as "United States Highways," selected by a joint board of federal and state highway officials. Among them is the Pacific highway and the route extending east and west across the state from Ontario through Eugene to Florence.

The roads will be designated by numbers and will be marked by signs bearing the shield of the United States. Danger and caution posts will show signs of four different shapes representing degrees of danger, with black letters and symbols on yellow backgrounds. Recommendation is made that the danger and caution markers be adopted for state highways.

STATE LAW ON EGGS IS EXPLAINED HERE

N. C. Maris Instructs Dealers In Requirements of Statute.

A campaign to familiarize Lane county dealers with the requirements of the recent law governing the sale of eggs was started in this county last week by N. C. Maris, deputy of the state food and dairy department. The law went into effect last May, but in this county there had been some doubt as to its provisions, it is said.

"The new law provides for three classes of eggs, fresh standard, fresh medium and fresh undersize. The class has to be marked on the case or on cartons when sold at retail. Eggs in bulk have to have a sign with letters not less than one inch in height stating the class of the eggs. Storage eggs are classed the same as fresh eggs but the word "fresh" is not to be used in this connection," Mr. Maris stated.

"All eggs are required to be candled and graded either by the producer, the jobber or the dealer. The weight has to be ascertained and the true grade marked in all cases," Mr. Maris states.

A standard egg is required to have a weight of not less than one and five-sixths ounces, a medium egg, one and seven-twelfths ounces. All under these weights are classed as undersize.

Boy and Girl Give Selves Up

Wayne McCue, Creswell youth, and June Jones, 15-year-old Cottage Grove girl, who a week ago rented an automobile at Springfield and disappeared, were brought back from Albany Friday by a deputy from the Lane county sheriff's office. According to the story told by the boy and girl, they ran out of gas at Albany and took to the woods, where they remained several days, finally deciding to go to Albany and give themselves up. McCue is in the county jail and the girl is being cared for by a woman who takes charge of young female county prisoners.

"America Wakes Up" Is Given

The pageant, "America Wakes Up," was given Sunday evening at the Presbyterian church under the direction of Mrs. Bert Trask. Miss Rachel Galloway took the leading role of the dramatist. The pageant sought to teach that religion must play an important part in making Americans of those who come from other shores and mix their blood with ours. HORSE IS KILLED WHEN STRUCK BY CAR

Teacher and Students Escape In- jury in Accident.

S. T. White, instructor in the Cottage Grove high school, and several students, narrowly escaped serious injuries last Friday night when Mr. White's car struck and killed a horse on the Pacific highway north of Harrisburg. Mr. White and his party were returning to this city from Lebanon, where they had attended the football game between the two schools.

A wagon with two horses tied behind was crossing the road in front of the car. One of the horses broke loose, running directly in front of the automobile, which carried it several feet before the animal rolled into the ditch. The car went into the ditch a few feet farther on.

The car was badly damaged and was taken to Harrisburg for repairs.

Lad's Hand Crushed In Bicycle Accident

Six-Year-Old Stone Glass Crashes Into Trailer Parked On Tenth Street.

Stone Glass, six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Glass, sustained a mangled right hand early Saturday evening when, while riding a bicycle, he collided with a heavy trailer parked in front of the Hiner machine shop. The bicycle ran under the heavy cross-piece of the trailer, the lad's hand being crushed between the heavy timber and the handle bar of the bicycle. He was taken to the office of Dr. A. W. Kime, where it was found necessary to amputate the index finger. The third finger was badly crushed but it may be possible to save this. The second finger was also severely injured but will be saved.

It was thought that the lad swung over against the trailer to avoid an approaching automobile.

OIL IS BROUGHT IN AT SAGE-OLSON WELL

Flow Struck at Petaluma Capped Until Tanks Are Ready.

Oil was brought in last week at Petaluma, Calif., at a well owned by Sage and Olson brothers, according to reports reaching here Thursday. It was reported the well was capped after the flow had been struck. Plans were being made to complete tanks and open the well Monday.

W. A. Sage, D. E. Olson and C. A. Olson, owners of the well, also are officers of the Guaranty Oil company now conducting drilling operations here and at Eugene. D. E. Olson left Eugene for Petaluma on receipt of the message.

Mr. Olson stated the Petaluma well had been located in 1922 and drilling had reached a depth of more than 2000 feet. The well is the first brought in in this part of California.

BETTIS & WYATT OPEN SUPER STATION

Second Member of Firm Is Former Resident of This City.

F. N. Bettis and E. E. Wyatt have opened in Eugene what is said to be the finest super-service station in Oregon. The opening of this business has been watched with interest here because of the fact that Mr. Wyatt, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Wyatt, is a former resident of this city.

The station is located at the corner of Ninth and Olive, one of the busiest intersections in Eugene. It has four gasoline pumps, 20 lubricating pumps and complete vulcanizing, accessory and cleaning and polishing departments. Brakel & White, auto electricians, will occupy a part of the building. A space 97x107 feet is occupied and the entire space is paved. There are four driveways entering the sheltered canopy.

Streams Closed to Fishing

All Lane county streams and lakes will be closed to trout fishing November 30, with the exception of tidewater streams. The tidewater streams include the Siuslaw river and a few small creeks flowing directly into the ocean. No definite tidewater limit has been set on the Siuslaw, but it is understood that tidewater is at a point about a mile above Mapleton.

Junction City Wins

Cottage Grove junior high eleven was defeated 13 to 7 by Junction City junior high Saturday afternoon on Kelly field. Lloyd Swanson, Cottage Grove player, suffered a broken nose. The game was the second one between the two teams, Cottage Grove losing 20 to 0 in Junction City, November 6.

Eugene Affairs Are In Financial Mess

Delivery of \$14,000 in War- rants Which Had Been As- signed Stirs Up Rumpus.

City affairs in Eugene are in a mess due to the delivery to Contractor George W. Read of \$14,000 in warrants which had been assigned to a bank in payment of a loan. It is further alleged that the money represented by the warrants was not due for 30 days following the date of their delivery. Recorder Gilmore blames Mayor Parks for the delivery, while the mayor blames the recorder. The warrants were at once cashed by Mr. Read, whose business is in the hands of a receiver.

It is said that neither the city of Eugene nor the bank will lose, both being protected by surety bonds and that no illegal act was committed by either the recorder or the mayor in the delivery of the warrants.

JAIL BREAK AT EUGENE IS FRUSTRATED

Officers Return in Time to Halt Plans for Escape.

At attempted jail break at the county jail in Eugene was frustrated Saturday night by the return of two police officers who discovered the preparations being made for escape. Frank Thomas and Charles Akers were the only men behind the bars at the time. They had been arrested early Saturday morning for robbery of the Danner-Robertson sporting goods store.

Part of the plumbing fixtures of the washstand had been pried loose and officers believed an attempt would have been made to force a door or window with the implements. The broken fixtures were dropped into the stove on the return of the officers.

SALVATION ARMY DRIVE GETS RESPONSE

Workers Collect Money to Spread Christmas Cheer Among Poor.

Cottage Grove responded generously to the drive conducted last week by the Salvation Army and as a result approximately \$100 was raised to provide Christmas cheer for needy families of this city. Mrs. Bob White and Mrs. Ida Park, Salvation Army workers, completed the drive Saturday after working the first three days of the week. Before leaving they voiced their appreciation of the way residents responded.

Baskets of food for Christmas tables and toys for children will be supplied to every needy family in this section, the workers said. Persons who know of such families are urged to report to the Salvation Army headquarters in Eugene.

Business men of Cottage Grove also will search for families who may be in need of gifts. C. A. Bartell will be in charge.

LANE COUNTY ROADS TO HAVE NEW SIGNS

Guide Posts to Be Placed at All Important Intersections.

Signs showing distances to towns and communities will be placed at all important road intersections of Lane county early next year, if plans outlined Thursday before the county court by J. E. Shelton, district director of the Oregon Motor association, materialize. Mr. Shelton said the association would furnish the signs and an engineer to designate the locations if the county would supply the posts and the labor to place them in the ground.

Members of the court appeared favorable to the plan. Prisoners probably will be used for the work, it is said.

The signs will be in place by the time the tourist travel starts next year, Mr. Shelton said. Lane county has long needed a system of guide posts, he asserted, and the system planned will cover the entire county.

NEW RESERVOIR IS TO BE PUT INTO USE

Filled to Five Feet for Start And This Gradually Increased.

The city's new million gallon reservoir will be in use before the end of the week. Godard & Randall, contractors, and the city having completed the replacing of the water mains and overflow lines down the hill. After the new reservoir is put into use the old reservoir will be drained and this will also be connected with the new line, which follows the street down the hill instead of crossing private property as heretofore.

The new reservoir will be filled gradually and only five feet of water will be in the big hole when it is put into use. The quantity will be increased a foot or so at a time under direction of H. S. Rogers, engineer in charge.

Two Are Injured In Motorcycle Crash

Joe Taylor and Earl VanValin Sent to Hospital But Are Again Home.

Joe Taylor of this city and Earl VanValin of Dorena were injured in a motorcycle accident Sunday forenoon at the Fifth street and Madison intersection on Pacific highway. It was at first thought that Taylor had sustained injuries that might prove fatal, but he is expected home today from the hospital to which both he and VanValin were rushed in the Mills ambulance immediately following the accident. VanValin returned from the hospital with the ambulance.

VanValin was traveling south on Fifth street in front of a large car. Taylor was traveling behind the same car. A motorcycle ahead of VanValin lost a part of its tail light and VanValin turned at the Madison avenue intersection to pick up what the motorcycle head had lost. At the same moment Taylor speeded up to pass the car ahead of him and struck the VanValin motorcycle on the intersection, the signal given by VanValin having been obscured by the car ahead of Taylor. Both motorcycles crashed to the pavement and Taylor was thrown against the curb on the wrong side of the street, sustaining an injury at the base of the skull and another across the face. Dr. Job, whose residence is on the corner at which the accident happened, was summoned. He administered first aid and accompanied both young men to the hospital.

Joe Taylor is the 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Taylor. VanValin is aged 21 and son of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. VanValin of Dorena.

Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 19.—An automobile stage on the way from Yreka to Roseburg early this morning struck and killed a large buck deer on the highway south of Canyonville. The animal jumped from a bank directly in front of the stage. The driver, N. Nye, was alone in the machine.

Mr. Nye brought the deer to this city and turned it over to a deputy game warden, who presented it to the Oregon Soldiers home.

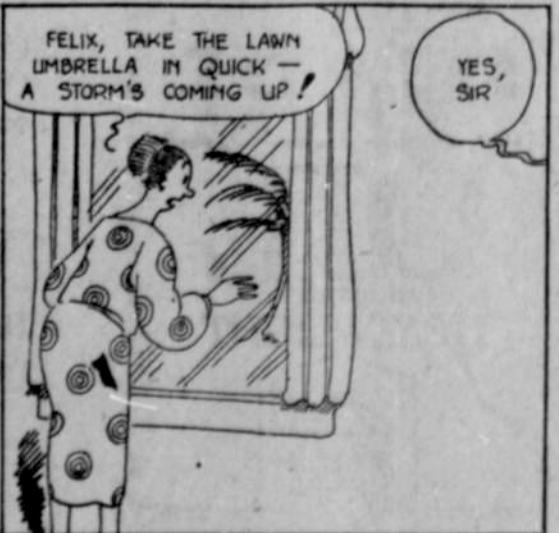
