LANE COUNTY BUDGET IS THOUGHT TOO LOW

Six Per Cent Limitation Prevents Increase Held Necessary.

The general fund budget of Lane county for the coming year is much lower than those of other counties of the state, using the relationship of budgets to assessed property valuations as a basis for comparison. Lane county, with an assessed property valuation of about three-quarters that of Lane has a general fund this year of \$354,144.85, while the Lane county general fund is \$309,330. In comparison with Lane county this county should have a fund of at least \$430,000, County Judge Barnard states.

Lane county lags behind other counties because of the six per cent limitation, based on the budget of 1923. This was too low and with the growth of the county and need for increased expenditure the budget is restricted to a limited increase based on a figure too low for the purpose, Judge Barnard says.

This restriction on the budget makes it necessary to call a special election to authorize extra expenditures. This applies to the improvement of the McKenzie and the Eugene-Florence highways. If Lane county is to have a new jail, as recommended by report of the grand jury, a special election will be necessary for this.

Lane county is also behind in market road funds, it is stated. Last year \$130,000 was available for this class of road, while Clackamas county had a fund of \$266,000.
