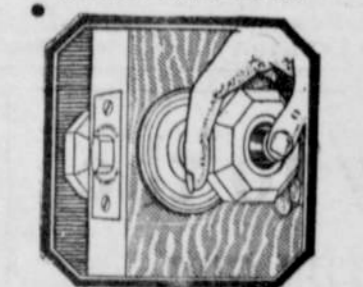

LANE COUNTY IS THIRD IN STATE IN DIVORCES

Separation Decrees Show Increase While Marriages Decline.

Lane county, with 117 divorces granted, was third in the state in 1924, according to statistics on marriages and divorces compiled by the government. Multnomah county led with a total of 1384 divorces and Clatsop county was second with 469.

During the same period Lane county reported 408 marriage licenses. The 1923 figure was 420. The decline might be attributed to failure of women to exercise their leap year prerogative.

The total number of divorces in the state in 1924 was 2945 in comparison with 2894 for 1923. Marriages in the state totalled 6967 against 7151 for 1923.
