County Clerk's Receipts Increase. Receipts at the office of R. S. Bryson, county clerk, for November totalled \$1605.35, an increase over the figures for November, 1924, when the total was \$1409.40. The receipts for November, 1925, were \$1155.85. These totals indicate the steady increase in business handled at the clerk's office. Of the total for the past month, \$918.75 was for recording fees, \$372 for circuit court fees, \$145 for probate, \$96 for marriage licenses and \$73.60 miscellaneous receipts.

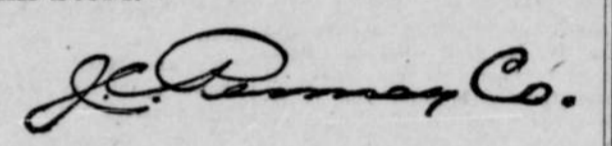
