KITCHEN CUPBOARD

For the Family Table

FOR a nice change from the regular way of serving veal cutlets, try these:

Put through the meat grinder one pound and a half of stewing veal. Season with one teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter teaspoonful of paprika, half a teaspoonful of grated onion, one tablespoonful of chopped parsley and one-half teaspoonful of poultry dressing. Form into cutlets, dip into egg and crumbs and cook in a little butter or sweet fat. Serve with:

Horseradish Sauce.—Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter, add one tablespoonful of flour and one cupful of white soup stock, season with salt and pepper, a little onion juice, one teaspoonful of fresh-grated horseradish root and one-quarter of a cupful of cream.

To Pickle Tongue.—Take one gallon of water, one and one-half pounds of salt, one-quarter pound of sugar and one-half ounce of saltpeter. Heat the mixture and pour it over the tongue.

Corned Beef.—For one hundred pounds of beef use four and one-half pounds of salt, one-half pound of sugar, two and one-quarter ounces of saltpeter to three gallons of water. Heat this mixture, cool and pour over the meat.

To Corn Veal.—Pack the veal into a jar with salt enough to season well; a little brown sugar and saltpeter sprinkled through it. To two gallons of water add two pints of salt, one pint of brown sugar, two tablespoonfuls of pulverized saltpeter. Pour this over the meat. Remove and scald, and cool again if it appears too sour, adding a little more salt.

Lemon Gelatin Pie.—Slice one banana very thin and pour over it three-quarters of a cupful of orange juice and one-half cupful of lemon juice, with one cupful of sugar. Let them stand one hour. Soak two tablespoonfuls of gelatin in one-half cupful of cold water five minutes; add one-half cupful of boiling water; add to the fruit juice and sugar and stir until dissolved. Chill, and when beginning to set, beat with an egg beater. Fold in one pint of cream, beaten stiff. Cool the mixture well and heap in a baked pastry shell.

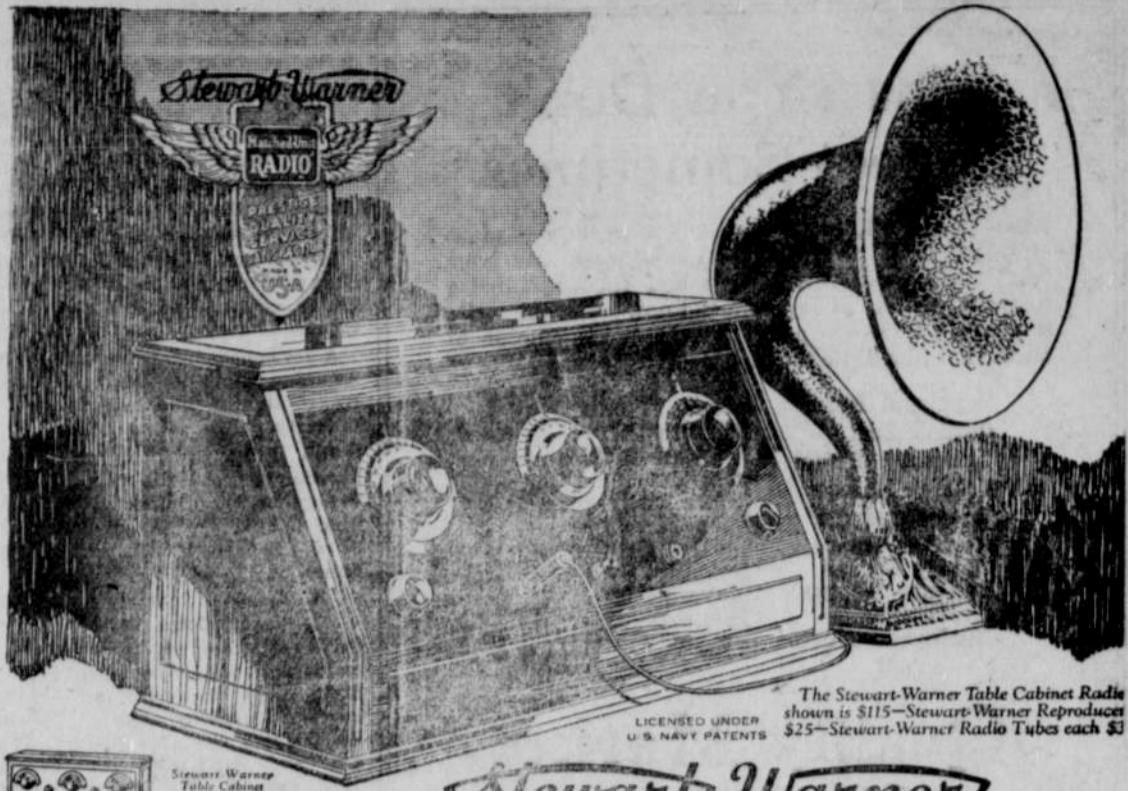
