Hardly an issue of a paper passes without the editor being requested to omit some item of news. The requests to omit are often as numerous as those to please print. The editor of a newspaper in a city the size of Cottage Grove usually has a heart and it never is a pleasure to publish items that are going to hurt someone. It is much more pleasant to publish something that will bring joy and happiness. But a newspaper is a newspaper, and it has certain duties which it can not neglect even for the closest friends. One of these duties is discouragement of law violations by giving

publicity to such violations. Publicity is the greatest known deterrent of crime.

Another duty is to its readers. Within certain bounds they are entitled to all the news, and what is news when it concerns someone unknown to the paper is also news when it concerns one who may contribute heavily to the paper's support.

The Sentinel often omits the names of children from a crime story upon the promise of the children or their parents that there will be no need for another such request. The Sentinel feels that it is warranted in doing this and it knows that it is much more pleasant to handle cases of child delinquency in this way. It feels that it has accomplished something in helping youngsters, and this recompense enough to offset any criticism.

Speaking generally, however, news is news, regardless of whom it may concern, and so far as possible friend and foe receive the same treatment.

The polls will be open for the purpose of said special election between the hours of 9 o'clock in the morning until 12 o'clock noon and from 1 o'clock in the afternoon until 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

The places at which the polls will be open within such corporation will be as follows:
