MORE SIDEWALK ADDED TO CITY IN NOVEMBER

Of 1152 Linear Feet Put in Large Portion Is Cement Material. 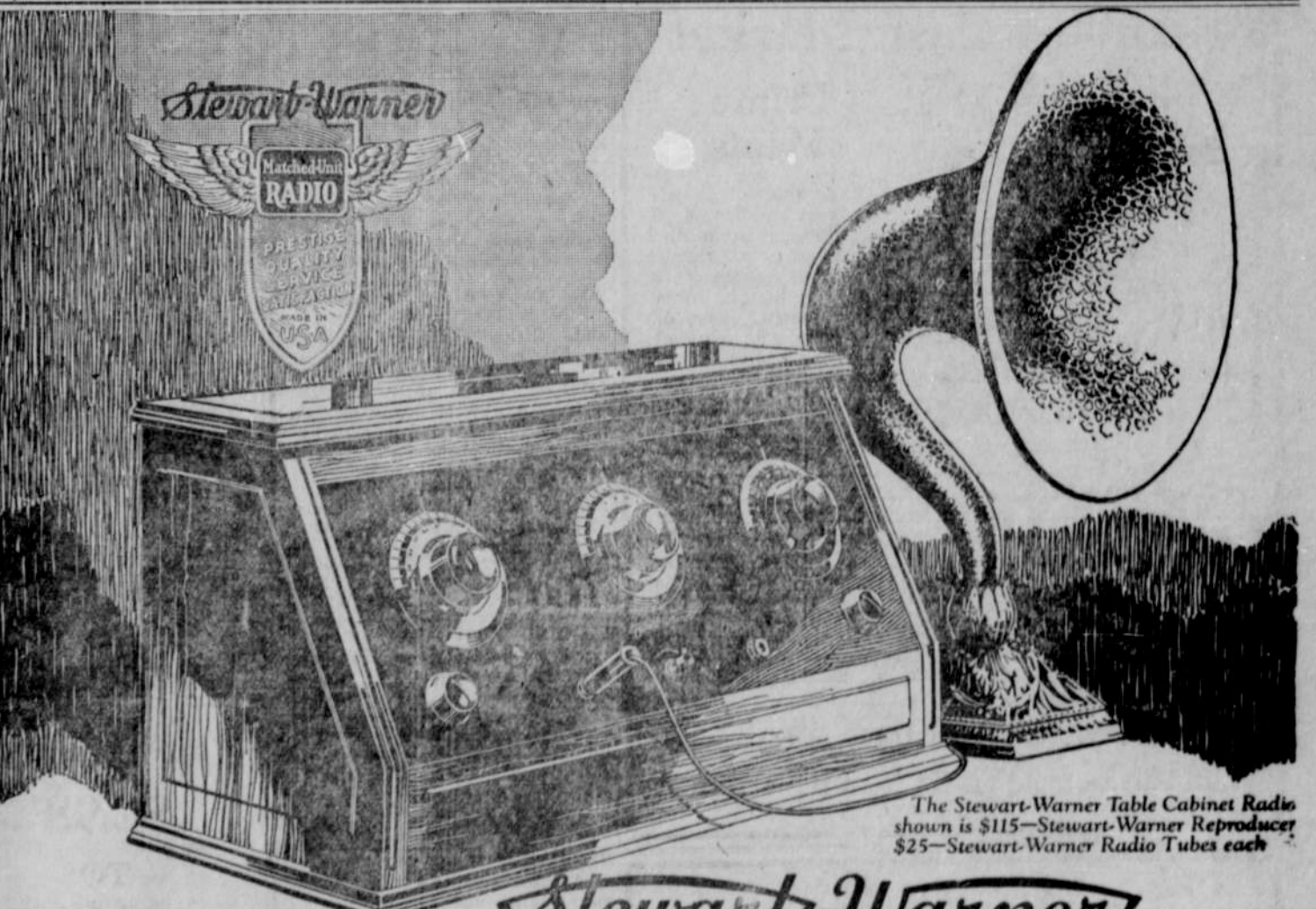
