Shortly before it reached Villard street, as it ran west, it became confused by the traffic and ran for a short distance in front of the street car, leaping along almost like a jackrabbit, conductors said. At that point the highway, railroad tracks and streetcar tracks run parallel, and the animal jumped in front of a freight train and then back in front of the streetcar.

St. Nick was evidently acting as protector to the deer, however, and the streetcar men did their share by slowing down. When last seen the deer was on its way down Franklin boulevard.

### Orders Top Output

Lumber Shipments for Week Are Seven and One-Half Per Cent Below Production.

Ninety-nine mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen association for the week ending December 19, manufactured 95,783,994 feet of lumber; sold 98,012,629 feet and shipped 88,715,397 feet.

New business was two and one-half per cent above production and shipments were seven and one-half per cent below production.

Forty per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 39,080,257 feet, of which 24,449,114 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 14,631,143 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 1832 cars.

Forty per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 35,753,025 feet, of which 20,319,929 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal, and 15,433,096 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 1633 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 3,972,372 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 109,091,115 feet. Unfilled export orders 104,838,075 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 4578 cars.

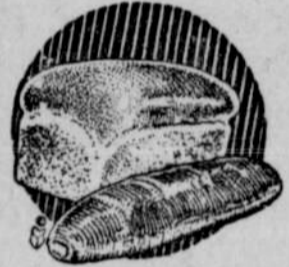
