Two Mail Routes Again Up for Bids

Discrepancies Found in Advertisements—Lorane Route Not Affected.

Two of the three star routes operated out of Cottage Grove post-office appearing in the general advertisement for proposals for carrying the mails from July 1, 1926, to June 30, 1930, will be re-advertised, according to advices received by Postmaster Smith last evening from the fourth assistant postmaster general. The routes to be re-advertised are Diaston route and Black Butte route, each about 60 miles in length. The order was received by wire and no reason for the action was given.

A number of changes have been made in these routes during the past four years and as some of these changes were not specified in the general advertisement it is probable that the department feared that the discrepancies between the advertisement and the service as now performed might tend to discourage prospective bidders.

The order does not affect the star route operated between Cottage Grove and Lorane. Bids for contracts on this route will be received at the office of the fourth assistant postmaster general in Washington until 4:30 p. m. of January 19, and the award of the contract will be made on or before February 23.

The advertisement of this route is posted on the bulletin board at the postoffice and Postmaster Smith announces that he will furnish prospective bidders with all information necessary for the preparation of proposals.
