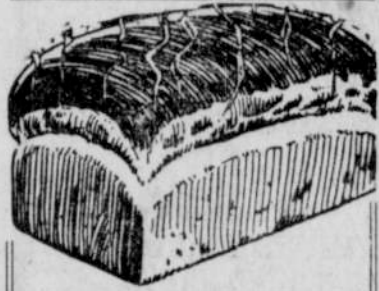

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Sweets for the Season

A GOODLY supply of sweets to pass around when entertaining is always a great satisfaction. Candied Peel—Cut orange or grapefruit into long strips, cover with water and bring to the boiling point; drain and repeat this three times. Measure an equal amount of sugar and enough water to cover. Simmer until translucent—the liquid will be nearly evaporated—drain and roll in granulated sugar. Fruit coloring, green or red, may be added to the grapefruit, adding to its appearance.

Croole Kisses.—Blanch one-half pound of almonds, finely shred half of them and dry slowly in the oven. Put one-fourth of a cupful of water, one-half cupful of sugar in a saucepan, and as soon as the boiling point is reached add the remaining almonds and cook until the syrup is a golden brown color. Turn into a pan, cool and pound in a mortar. Beat the whites of four eggs until stiff; add gradually one and one-fourth cupfuls of powdered sugar, then one-half teaspoonful of vanilla and the pounded almonds and sugar and one-fourth teaspoonful of salt. Shape, sprinkle with shredded almonds, dust with sugar and bake in a slow oven twenty-five minutes.

Molasses Chips.—Put three cupfuls of sugar, one-fourth teaspoonful of cream of tartar and one cupful of water into a kettle. Stir until the boiling point is reached, brushing down the sides of the kettle to remove any grains, using a brush dipped into cold water. Add two-thirds of a cupful of molasses and cook until the candy becomes brittle. Remove from the fire, add one-third of a cupful of butter, a pinch of salt and a little vanilla. Pour into buttered plates to cool, then pull and cut into pieces.

Coconut Caramels.—Cook one cupful of brown sugar, one-fourth cupful of corn syrup, two tablespoonfuls of butter, and one-fourth cupful of boiling water. Cook to a soft ball when dropped into cold water. Remove from the heat, stir until cool, adding one-half cupful of coconut, then pour into a pan powdered with sugar. Cannery Operates At Profit in 1925

Capital Stock Is to Be Increased From \$20,000 To \$30,000.

The Cottage Grove cannery showed a profit of more than \$1200 during the year, according to the report submitted today to the annual meeting of stockholders. The meeting voted to raise the capitalization from \$20,000 to \$30,000 in order to provide for enlarging the capacity of the plant.

S. L. Godard, F. C. Fuhrer and Andrew Brund were elected directors. The holdover directors are G. O. Knowles, C. A. Stevens and Frank Sly. At a meeting of the directors, Mr. Knowles was elected president and manager.

Sheriff Sells Calapooya Property.

The hotel, springs, swimming tank, real estate and personal property of the Calapooya Springs company at London, 12 miles south of Cottage Grove, were sold at sheriff's sale Saturday to the Union Loan and Savings association of Portland, which held a mortgage on the property for over \$10,000.

Taxes to Be Paid Later.

Under a new law passed at the last session of the state legislature the first half of 1925 taxes will not be delinquent until May 5, instead of April 5 as heretofore, and likewise the second half will not be delinquent until November 5, instead of October 5.

Minor Pays Fine.

Dana McCargar was fined \$5 and Earl Hill, proprietor of the Eagle Cigar store, was fined \$20 in police court Saturday, the first for misrepresenting his age in a pool hall, the second for allowing a minor to play. The complaint was filed by the police.

How Wylackie Indians Capture Their Fish

Before beginning the fishing operations it was incumbent upon them to eat up five small deer which they had brought into camp. William Kent writes, in the Yale Review, concerning the Wylackie Indian tribe. This was a worthwhile performance. The deer were skinned and hung up near the fire. The Indians sat around, each with a sharpened stick. They went to the pendant carcasses and cut off strips which they then partially broiled and swallowed, and continued in this occupation without napkins or finger bowls for about fifteen hours, at which time they exhibited considerable distention. From time to time the stripped bones were handed out to the non-descript dogs that always signalize an Indian camp. After this sumptuous repast both people and dogs were able to endure several days of fasting without complaint.

However, after a due allowance of sleep, our friends went out for fish, and it was a most interesting performance. Out of respect for us they refrained from the easy use of dynamite and put in practice an ancient method of getting results.

Going to a deep pool in a rock cleft they beat upon the water with branches, threw in stones and scared the school of fish until, like so many small trout, they took refuge under the banks. Then an able-bodied Indian stripped and, taking in his hand a small scoop net without a handle, dived down into the icy depths. He swam under the rocky bank until only his legs were visible in the clear water. He succeeded in getting a big fish into the net and came in triumph to the surface to drag him out in shallow water. We who considered ourselves fishermen were forced to praise and admiration of such a feat. I commend it as real sportsmanship.
