**COUNTY PRISONERS 594 DURING TAYLOR'S TERM**

During the 18 1/2 months which Sheriff Frank E. Taylor has been in office, 594 prisoners have been locked up in the Lane county jail, according to figures in the office of Harold Lee, jailer.

The sheriff was appointed to the office January 1, 1924, and was elected in November of that year. Ever since then, the records show, the county jail has been an exceedingly busy place.

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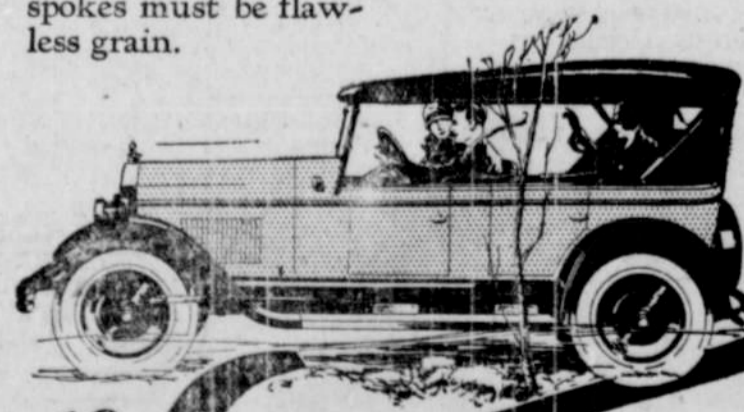
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
