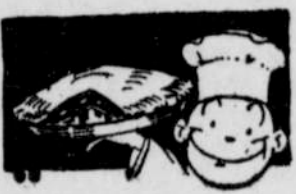

CLAY LEWIS IS ARRESTED IN FRISCO FOR FORGERY

Detectives found Lewis impersonating the cashier of a local bank from the hotel telephone booth in conversation with the hotel manager recommending himself for credit.

Yokel Loses to Meeske.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 15.—Billy Meeske, Chicago wrestler, won two straight falls over Mike Yokel, claimant of the world's light heavyweight championship, here tonight in a bout featured by the death of a spectator from excitement and an unscheduled tussle between Referee Al Warsinske and Meeske.

Meeske won the first fall in 45 minutes and the second in five seconds, knocking out Yokel as he threw him. Meeske failed to get off Yokel at the referee's command and Warsinske pulled him off and held him down with a headlock until Meeske was assured he had won.

Yokel doesn't lose his recently won light heavyweight championship, for the reason that Meeske is in the heavyweight class.

Old Book Tells Of Indian Days

Mrs. Dorrell Has Geography Printed in 1845 and Letter of 1830.

Lorane Route, Jan. 12.—(To the Editor.)—I have seen in your paper an item about old documents owned by Mr. Bennett, which reminded me of a letter and book of considerable age that I cherish.

The book is "Smith's Geography" and was published in 1845 in New York by Paine & Burgess. It has about 300 pages and is about 4x7 inches. Speaking of Oregon territory it says, "The inhabitants consist of about 60,000 Indians, with a few white settlers, American missionaries and hunters of the Hudson's Bay Co. The climate is salubrious. Grains, fruits and vegetables are successfully cultivated." The book speaks of the United States and British claims and occupancy by both and mentions Columbia river with one paragraph, Fort Vancouver another and Astoria another. Other countries and subjects are written about in the same short way.

The first page of this book says, "For use in schools, academies and families."

The old letter is one that has the sheets folded to form the envelope and was sealed with wax.

The figure 10 is in the corner where we place our stamp, and in the left hand corner, "Pittsburg, Oct. 10, 1830."

The writing is quite legible.

Have also another old letter dated October 20, 1852.

In opening the geography again I see an interesting paragraph on modes of travel.

Q. What improvement of travelling has been adopted within a few years past?

A. Travelling in steam boats and on railroads.

Q. How are railroads made?

A. A common road is made as nearly level as it can conveniently, then bars of iron are laid down, sometimes on timbers and sometimes on large stones fixed in the ground, for the wheels of carriages to run on. The carriages are called cars.

Q. How do they appear in the picture to be moved? How fast do some go by steam?

A. Forty-two miles an hour, and even more sometimes, but usually not more than twenty miles an hour, which is a mile in three minutes.

Valuable Property In Eugene Has No Owner

(Eugene Guard.)

Of more than 30,000 separate pieces of property in Lane county that are extended on the tax rolls there are only four or five carried on the assessor's record as "ownership unknown," according to Ben F. Keeney, county assessor.

One of the pieces of property, the only one in Eugene, is attracting considerable interest as it consists of valuable land at the crossing of the railroad at Blair boulevard.

The piece in question which has never been assessed is triangular in shape and has a dimension of 3102 feet along the main line of the Southern Pacific, 1722 on the east side of Blair boulevard and 1445 feet along the Willamette Pacific line where it branches off to the west from the main line.

When the addition was replatted several years ago this triangular piece of land was found to be without known owners and no assessment has ever been placed on it, the assessor states.

There is a possibility that it may have been a part of the McClaren estate, but this is only conjecture, Mr. Keeney said today in discussing this rather interesting bit of land that seemingly has strayed from the county records.

County Asked to Take Road.

Asking that a road running east from the Pacific highway south of Latham be taken over by the county a petition bearing the signatures of 31 residents of that district was filed with the county court last week.

This is a private route partly improved, and is the one used in getting to the mill of the Bohemia Lumber company. It also serves a number of settlers.
