Sugar From Linen. There is now in Germany a manufactory which turns out daily 1,000 pounds of pure white sugar made from old linen. An understanding of the process helps somewhat to dispel the unpleasant feeling we experience on hearing of the fact. Clean old linen is vegetable fibrin, and when treated with sulphuric acid, it is converted into dextrin. This is washed with lime water, then treated with more acid, and it changes almost immediately, and crystallizes into glucose or grape-sugar, which is so highly valued in the making of rich preserves and jellies. The process is said to be economical, and the sugar is found to be chemically the same as the grape.
