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UNREQUITED COMMUNITY EFFORT SOON TO GO.

It is a striking fact that, despite a larger chamber of commerce membership probably than ever before in the history of civic organizations here, despite the fact that for one of the few times in many years the chamber is able to meet its bills promptly, it really seems to accomplish no more than it did years ago when its checks were of doubtful value.

Of course, committees are reported to be working upon some big things that can not be made public, but there are little things being neglected that should be done, the whole of which might be more than the accomplishment of one big thing.

When the proposition was broached to have chamber of commerce members attend meetings of the Farmers' union and assist with programs, it was stated that it would be impossible to get those who should assist to go to such meetings. This has proved more or less true, but not entirely so, and the reception that has been given the few that have attended such meetings has been such as to confirm the prediction that whole-hearted cooperation with the farmers of the community, to be demonstrated in large part by getting out and mingling with them, would be one of the biggest things any civic organization here has ever put over.

It is passing strange that, despite complaints that business is rotten, few are ready to admit that they have time to assume any of the responsibilities of committee work, yet in days of not so long ago we used to go more places

than we do now when it is far more convenient to visit neighboring cities than it used to be. It is necessary to have noon luncheons so that members can attend meetings without losing valuable time.

As time goes on this condition probably will get worse rather than better and the time is rapidly approaching when every civic activity must have a directing head who is paid to attend to the things which the membership may be willing to do but does not do. For very little longer can we depend upon the membership of any organization to give any great amount of time in carrying forward the objects of such organization.

Each member of the chamber probably would rather pay someone to do his part for him than to take time to do it for himself. A secretary who will give all his time to looking after the business of the chamber of commerce must soon be considered if the organization's work is to be carried on as it should be, just as the city government soon is likely to need a paid official to do the routine work that councilmen are now doing.

The time when a few will neglect their business to do the things for the community that others are willing to let them do is almost at an end in cities the size of Cottage Grove, and the benefits to be derived from the new system that is bound soon to materialize probably would offset many times the cost.
