## BOOTH KELLY COMPANY RECOVERS FROM O. & C.

Salem, Ore., Feb. 16.—The Booth Kelly Lumber company recovers \$48,209.28 and Andrew B. Hammond and Charles G. Winton recover \$114,932.50 from the Oregon & California Railroad company as a result of two opinions of the supreme court today, both written by Justice Bean and both affirming Judge Robert Tucker of the lower court for Multnomah county. The Oregon & California Railroad company was appellant in both cases. The opinions are practically identical with the exception of the amounts involved and certain dates. Justice Rand dissented in the opinions.
