State Senate Post Is Aim of Maglady

Cottage Grove Lumberman Will Seek Renomination At May Primaries.

J. S. Maglady, state senator from Lane, made formal announcement Saturday of his intention to again seek the republican nomination.

While Mr. Maglady lives in Eugene, his business interests are largely in Cottage Grove, where he is owner of 50 per cent of the Bohemia Lumber company.

On being asked what particular legislation he had in his mind, he said: "I have no hobby, and no particular legislation. I am interested in the progress and development of Oregon and Lane county and would favor any legislation that would encourage industry. This means the farming and dairy industries among others. I have always favored education in all its branches and expect to continue to do so. I believe all major changes in our system of taxation should be referred to the people."

Tax Information Is Given by Collector

Explanations Made of Points Which Are Misunderstood By Taxpayers.

James L. Furnish, deputy collector of internal revenue, says he finds that hundreds of taxpayers are confused as to the provisions of the new income tax law and are unable to determine whether or not they should file returns of income this year. For their information and guidance Mr. Furnish has issued the following statement:

"Income tax returns must be filed on or before March 15 by the following:

"Every existing partnership, regardless of amount of income.

"Every existing corporation, regardless of amount of income.

"Every single (unmarried) individual having a net income of \$1500 or more.

"Every married person having a personal or a joint net income of \$3500 or more.

"Every person having a gross income of \$5000 or more, regardless of the net income.

"Extensions for filing returns will be granted only as follows:

"To individuals whose net income amounts to \$5000 or more and to domestic corporations, provided a tentative return is filed on or before March 15 showing estimated tax, accompanied by the payment of one-fourth of the estimated tax.

"Individuals whose net income does not exceed \$5000 may secure an extension by applying to the collector of internal revenue prior to March 15, and then only in case of sickness or absence from the state of the taxpayer."

BARNARD IS CANDIDATE CROWE HASN'T SPOKEN

County Judge Charles P. Barnard has stated that in all probability he will seek renomination at the primaries in May.

Judge Barnard will have served six years at the end of this year. He said Saturday that there are a number of projects that he desires to see finished before he goes out of office and that they cannot be completed in the short time he has yet to serve.

The term of O. E. Crowe, county commissioner, will expire this year but he has not stated whether or not he will be a candidate for renomination.
