In the circuit court of the state of Oregon for Lane county, Edward B. Smith, plaintiff, vs. Hattie E. Smith, defendant.

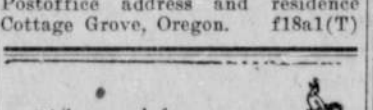
To Hattie E. Smith, the above named defendant:

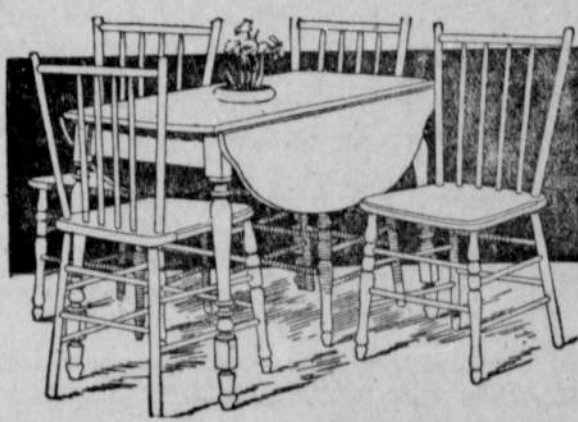
