KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Something Good to Eat
TO BEGIN the meal a good soup is never to be slighted in anyone's home.

Cream of Corn Soup.—In a double boiler, set to cook one quart of milk, one and one-half cups of canned corn, half an onion, three sprigs of parsley, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of paprika and one teaspoonful of salt. When hot stir in two tablespoonfuls of flour mixed with a little cold milk; stir until thickening begins, then cover and cook fifteen minutes; remove the onion and parsley and press through a sieve. Serve garnished with popcorn.

Leg of Mutton in Brine.—Remove the skin from a leg of mutton or a yearling lamb, the leg to weigh six or more pounds. Prepare a brine strong enough to float a fresh egg, add one tablespoonful of saltpeter and let the meat boil for five minutes in the brine, then reduce the heat to simmering and cook one-half to two hours, according to the weight of the leg. Serve with caper sauce and boiled white turnips. Many who do not relish mutton will enjoy it cooked in this way.

Savory Rice With Sausage.—Set over the fire one cupful of rice in six cupfuls of cold water and bring quickly to the boiling point; let boil five minutes, drain, rinse in cold water, drain again. To the blanched rice add one cupful of strained tomato, two cupfuls and one-half of chicken stock, one teaspoonful of salt, one small onion sliced, three cloves, half of a green pepper and one sprig of parsley; let cook until the rice is tender, then with two silver forks mix with one cupful of grated cheese and three tablespoonfuls of butter. Serve with baked sausage.

Broiled Mackerel.—Soak a salted mackerel in cold water to remove the excess of salt, drain and wipe dry; broil on a well-oiled broiler, basting with melted butter twice. Arrange on a hot platter and pour a cupful of hot cream over it just as it goes to the table.

Obituary of Emma Caroline Jones.
London, March 17.—(Special).—Emma Caroline Jones was born in Carl county, Ill., October 30, 1860, and died March 14, 1926, aged 65 years, 4 months, 14 days. She crossed the plains with her parents in 1864. The family spent a year at Sublimity, Ore., and in 1865 moved to Marysville, Calif., remaining there a year. They returned to Oregon in the fall of 1866, locating on a homestead two miles south of London, which was the home of Miss Jones until the death of her mother in 1919. After that she lived with her sister, Mrs. Susan Walker of Black Butte. While she had been in ill health for several months, her death came suddenly. She had been a member of the Church of Christ about 37 years. She is survived by her step father, Elisher Geer; a sister, Mrs. Susan Walker; a half sister, Mrs. Anna Lively, all of Black Butte; a brother, W. T. Jones of London. The funeral was held at the church at London Tuesday, March 16. Services were in charge of J. N. Hogue. Music was furnished by a mixed quartet. Interment was in the Taylor-Lane cemetery, where eight others of the family are buried.

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Favorite Dishes
THE old saw, "What is one man's meat is another man's poison," is true of likes and dislikes. Of what some are exceedingly fond, others will not enjoy at all. A very appetizing and palatable dish that our Welsh friends enjoy is:

Buttermilk Soup.—Heat two quarts of buttermilk to the boiling point. Mix three tablespoonfuls of flour with three beaten eggs; when a smooth paste is formed, add a little of the hot buttermilk and stir it into the soup. Let boil up once, add butter and sugar to taste and serve hot.

Plum Cake.—Take one pound of light bread dough warmed slightly, add one cupful each of molasses and sugar, one cupful of butter, three eggs, one and three-quarters cupfuls of flour, mixed spices to taste, a little extract of lemon, or better, the grated rind of a lemon; mix thoroughly to a smooth batter and set in a warm place to rise. In about three hours beat again, add a cupful of raisins, half a cupful of currants and one-quarter cupful of finely sliced citron. Flour the fruit before adding. Line pans or molds with buttered paper, half fill with the dough, set to rise again for about two hours. Bake in a moderate oven. Test with a wooden toothpick to be sure they are well baked.

Court Bouillon.—Take four quarts of water, one onion, one slice of carrot, two cloves, two tablespoonfuls of salt, one teaspoonful of pepper, one tablespoonful of vinegar, the juice of half a lemon and a bouquet of sweet herbs. Tie the onion, carrot, cloves and herbs in a piece of muslin and put into the water with the other ingredients. Cover and simmer for one hour; now add a fish which is to be boiled and cook as usual. Tie the fish in a thin cheesecloth to keep it from breaking. This method gives a fine flavor to fish. Serve with any good fish sauce.

Allemande sauce is prepared like a white sauce, using stock instead of milk, then a little lemon juice, egg yolks, salt, pepper and a very light pinch of nutmeg.

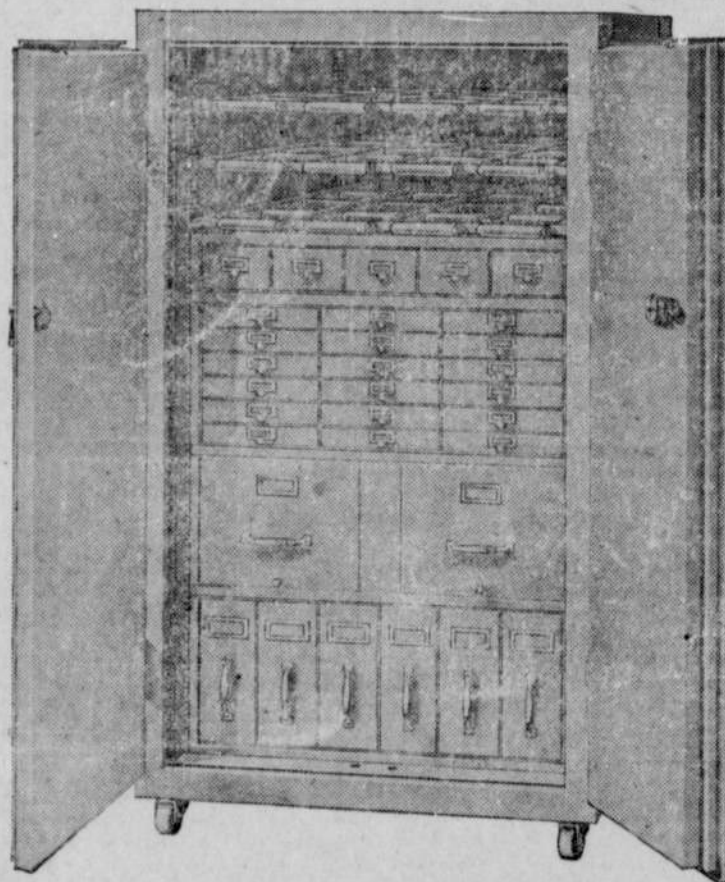

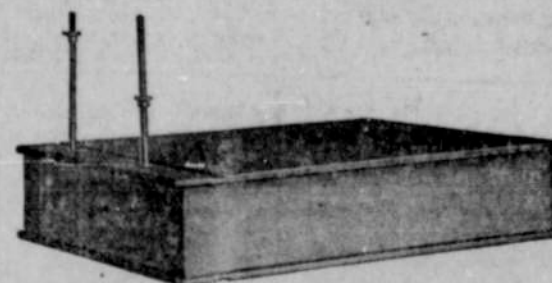

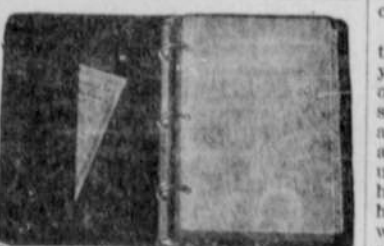
