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CIRCULAR SAWMILLS.

According to the Four L Lumber News, Cottage Grove has again produced something that is known nowhere else in the world, as usual, The Sentinel carried the news to the outside world.

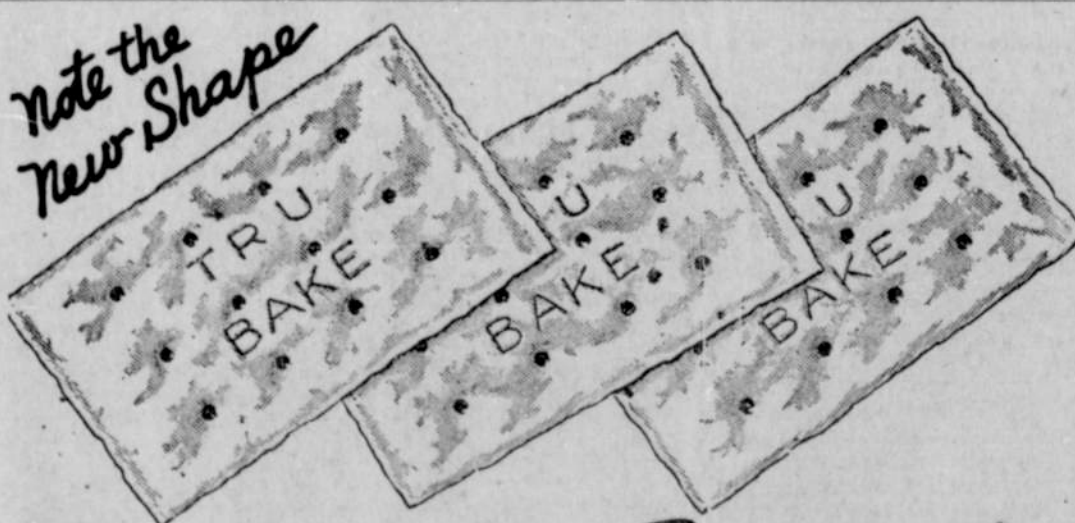
