SCUTTLE THE PRIMARY.

The Oregon Journal, that intrepid defender of the common weal, is having an awful stomach ache over the pre-primary county conventions which republicans have dared to hold. "Who are the high-browed gentlemen," the Journal wishes to know, "who plan to take away from the plain citizens their right to nominate candidates for office?"

Of course these conventions which the Journal so stoutly condemns take away none of the rights of the plain citizen whom the Journal so stoutly defends. He can go right on nominating his candidates and have their names on the ballot just as he always has done. The Journal isn't as ignorant of this fact as it pretends to be.

But the exasperatingly funny thing in connection with the Journal's defense of the primary-given rights of the dear "peopul" is that they won't rise up to assist the Journal in the noble fight which it is waging for them. We're willing to wager a year's subscription to The Sentinel against a year's subscription to the Journal, which is giving the Journal odds of about two to one, that if a measure should be put on the ballot to do away with the primary method of nominating candidates the Journal couldn't vociferate loud enough and long enough to get 25 per cent of the voters out to the polls to defend with their ballots their right to nominate candidates of their own and other parties. The Journal needn't worry about that, however, for small as the percentage might be, it would, without doubt, be more than enough

to foil any attempt to scuttle the primary, however much some high-browed gentlemen might wish to scuttle it.

Theoretically the primary system of nominating candidates is the highest form of democracy. In practice it is far from that and no man of moderate means can afford to let the people "call" him to be a candidate for high office. A candidate for United States senator can't let the people know they are "calling" him unless he is willing to spend a year's salary, or has friends willing to spend that amount for him.

Despite any criticism that may be justly or unjustly hurled at it, The Sentinel doesn't anticipate that anything is going to happen to the primary system of nominating candidates. Conditions that existed here under the old convention system are yet too fresh in mind. If anything does happen to it, the people themselves will be to blame, for by their votes alone can any change be made, which the Journal knows or will have to admit that it is woefully ignorant of the provisions of our constitution. And what the people want the Journal must defend.

The pre-primary conventions against which the Journal ululates can do no harm and can abridge no rights of the people except by the consent of the people. The conventions against which the Journal loudly inveighs have done nothing except what the Journal has approved when it has been done by farmers' organizations or by minority parties which yet nominate by the convention system.

The greatest fault of the direct primary is that the voters are willing to give so little time and thought to the selection of candidates. It is a good sign when any large number of citizens of any organization, farmer, political or otherwise, are willing to give the time and expend the effort necessary to hold a convention to express a choice on candidates. If these conventions do nothing else, they will stir voters to exercise the rights which the Journal fears the people are going to allow some high-browed gentlemen to take away from them. The Journal ought to be willing to admit that such a result is highly desirable and in line with its own policies.

Endorsement of candidates by a farmers' organization we recognize as assistance to the primary system of selecting candidates. Why can't the two dominating parties do what other organizations do with the approval of the Journal?

Mrs. Betty Kappauf of Cottage Grove is secretary for the Shumway for Senator committee and will have charge of publicity. If Shumway doesn't win, it won't be because he didn't get the best assistants that were to be had.

The Eugene Register finds that the average editor has a vocabulary of over 40,000 words. Even this number sometimes is insufficient to tell the truth about the candidates of the other party. Possibly that is the reason the truth is so seldom told.

It seems that every resident of Cottage Grove is striving to make it a city of pretty and beautiful homes. Never before has there been so much beautifying of yards and repainting and remodeling of dwellings.

Calculation of Size of Statue of Apollo

The famous problem concerning the size of the colossal statue of Apollo on the island of Delos, which has worried so many savants, has finally been solved.

We are familiar with the Delos Apollo only in miniature, as represented on the Attic tetradrachm, an ancient Greek coin, where the god is shown holding the three graces in his right hand.

At a recent meeting of the academy of inscriptions Theodore Heinsch announced that he had calculated with the aid of history as well as mathematics, the size of Apollo and the three Graces. This archaic colossus at Delos was the masterpiece, in gilded wood, of the sculptors Tavratis and Aggelion, who flourished between 550 and 530 B. C.

The three Graces, which were not grouped, but separated and erect, bore, respectively, the ather, the double flute and the pipes of Pan. They stood in the palm of Apollo's right hand. In his left hand he carried a bow. The colossus and its three statues were destroyed by fire.

With the assistance of a Delian inscription which mentioned the weight of the gold crowns designed for the god and the Graces, M. Heinsch estimated the relative heights of the figures as eight meters for the Apollo and the three Graces, eighty centimeters for each of the Graces.

Idea of Inferiority

Not at All Common

The feeling of inferiority is an experience so nearly universal that it cannot be considered abnormal or evidence of disease, declares a writer in Hygeia Magazine. Burmese Rubies Best

The finest ruby mines are those of Mogok in Upper Burma. It is from these mines that the pigeon-blood rubies come. These are considered very valuable. There are also mines in the neighboring country of Siam. These Siamese rubies are of a brownish red. The Burmese rubies bring from two to ten times as much as the Siamese rubies. The Burma mines are now controlled by the Ruby Mines Ltd., of London. Among the largest rubies may be mentioned two belonging to the king of Bishenpur, in India, which weighed 504 and 174 carats, respectively. The largest ruby known is one from Tibet, weighing 2,000 carats, but it is not of first quality.

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Seasonable Good Things

IS THERE any one who does not enjoy a rich, spicy, sugary cinnamon bun?

Philadelphia Cinnamon Bun.—Place in a double boiler one cupful of milk and bring it to the boiling point. Add one-half cupful of boiling water and cool to 90 degrees. When lukewarm, add one yeast cake softened in one-quarter cupful of water; add to the rest of the liquid, and flour, about four cupfuls, to make a dough, adding a teaspoonful of salt. Knead until the ingredients are well-mixed; cover and set in a warm place where the temperature is maintained at about 90 degrees Fahrenheit, keeping the dough over hot water or in the warming oven. When risen to double its bulk add one-half cupful each of butter and flour and two eggs. Work in more flour, so that the dough can be handled. Remove the dough to a well-floured board and roll into a sheet less than one-half inch in thickness, fifteen inches long and eighteen inches wide. Over the surface sprinkle thickly one-half cupful of sugar which has been evenly mixed with one teaspoonful of cinnamon. Cover thickly with two cupfuls of cleaned raisins and one cupful of seeded raisins, which have been cut into halves. Flour the hands well and gently raise the edge of the dough, the long side, rolling carefully not to disturb the temperature and sugar. A broad spatula will be helpful in making the start. When all is rolled cut into eight equal portions, using a sharp knife and a quick stroke. Have ready a greased and floured round cake pan four inches deep and ten inches in diameter, with a removable rim. Reshape the portions as they become flattened by cutting, place one in the center and the rest surrounding it. Cover and put in a warm place to rise about an hour, or until nearly double in bulk.

Slightly caramelize two cupfuls of sugar, adding one-half cupful of water. Pour over the bun as it is ready for the oven and bake until it is well done. Allow to cool slightly before removing from the pan. When cold cut into wedge-shaped pieces and reheat in a hot oven just before serving.
