Sarah Elizabeth Rawlings, aged 88 years, who had lived in this vicinity since 1890, died at 8 o'clock Sunday morning at her home above Blue Mountain. Old age was the cause of death. She was born September 28, 1838, at Portland, Mo. She is survived by a son, Joseph Perkins, a sister, Mrs. Annie Lyon, and a brother, Rufus Rawlings. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at Blue Mountain cemetery, with Pastor N. B. Walden officiating.

Two-Thirds of Children Are Without Religion

Dr. Andrews Says Home Is Logical Agency For Religious Teaching.

That two-thirds of the children in the Pacific Northwest are receiving no systematic religious education and that two-thirds of those in Sunday schools of various denominations lose contact with church between the ages of 12 and 20 were points brought out at a supper at the Methodist church Friday.

Dr. C. I. Andrews, conference director of religious education for Oregon, held a round table discussion with the Sunday school board and church workers to plan new methods of teaching christianity. The home is the logical agency through which it can be taught, was the belief expressed.

Teachers of the primary, junior and intermediate departments of the Sunday school discussed problems with Dr. Andrews Saturday afternoon. Dr. Andrews delivered the sermon at both the forenoon and evening services Sunday.

Pre-Easter Revival Starts.

A pre-Easter Revival will be held at the Christian church this week beginning with a service this evening. Special music will be featured at each service. Pastor Kenneth J. Husby will speak this evening on "Three Answers to the Same Question"; Tuesday, "Some Cottage Grove Citizens Mentioned in the Bible"; Wednesday, "Last Will and Testament of John Brown"; Thursday, "Devil's Soothing Syrup"; Friday, "Ups and Downs of a Fast Young Man"; Saturday, "A Message from Hell"; Sunday forenoon, "Resurrection—a Proof of Christianity"; Sunday evening, "God's Last Invitation." Gordon Hypes will be the soloist at each service. Wednesday evening a junior choir of 50 voices will sing. Two pianos will be used in the musical numbers each evening.

Basketball Shield Coming.

The Lions Pioneers have received word from the Eugene Y. M. C. A. that the trophy shield, emblematic of the basketball championship of the Lane County Pioneer league, will be sent to them soon. The Lions will hold a meeting Tuesday evening to organize a baseball team and plan to enter the Pioneer league.
