SERVICE OF SUMMONS IS ILLEGAL, McFARLAND

Frank McFarland, deputy sheriff and co-defendant in the suit of Ellis Williams against Sheriff Frank Taylor et al, has filed a motion in the circuit court to set aside the service of summons, because the certified copies were not served on the defendants by the county coroner.

The case is that in which Williams claims nearly \$24,000 alleged damages as the result of being shot in the thigh October 23, 1925, when Sheriff Taylor and several deputies stopped the Williams automobile and proceeded to search it, with the result that the suspect gave flight and was fired upon by the officers.

Under the statute, service of summons on the sheriff, or on deputies of the sheriff, must be made by the county coroner.

TWENTY-TWO EXAMINED AT CHILD HEALTH CLINIC

Twenty-two children were examined at the clinic held Saturday by the Cottage Grove public health group. Many were unable to be examined because of lack of time. The general condition of a large majority of the children was found to be excellent, few defects being noted. The health group hopes to be able to examine before school opens in the fall those who failed to get an examination Saturday.

The nursing committee of the local group were in charge of the clinic and Doctors Job, Kimo, Forbes and Axley volunteered their services. Mrs. Charles Adams, chairman of the committee, was assisted by Mrs. Schofield Stewart, Mrs. Harold Axley, Miss Naomi Hoskins and Miss Bowen.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL FOR WEEK DAYS PROPOSED

Interest in a week-day religious school for this community and Latham has been growing. The Latham Community club is studying plans for such a school and hopes to be able to start a course this fall. The ministerial association of this city favors starting the work and a city organization has promised to furnish the finances.

The week-day religious school is entirely non-sectarian. The idea is to give school children knowledge of the bible, to teach them spiritual values while the regular school develops the mental and physical features.

The child attends the religious school on regular time, probably an hour a week, and is given credit for the work. A course of study is provided by the state superintendent of public instruction.

Two Are So Terribly Mangled That Identification Was Almost Impossible.

An official investigation by the Southern Pacific is being held this afternoon.

The funeral of Mrs. Shortridge was held at 1 o'clock yesterday at the S. P. Shortridge home, Pastor Crawford officiating. Interment was in the pioneer Taylor-Lane cemetery. Mrs. Shortridge, whose maiden name was Ellen Jane Keyes, was born March 12, 1846, in Hancock county, Ill. She crossed the plains in 1853 and had lived here ever since. She married W. W. Shortridge, also a pioneer of 1853, and the union existed for 64 years. Of 11 children born, all survive except one. They are Clarence, Sherman, Alonzo, Bud and Sam of Cottage Grove; Lane Shortridge, Roseburg; Mrs. Symantia Brown, Mrs. Emily Adams, Mrs. Lilly Sutherland and Mrs. Francis Thorn of this city. The husband died four years ago.

The funeral of Mrs. Kern will be held tomorrow afternoon. Pastor Forrester of Roseburg, formerly of the Free Methodist church here, will officiate. Mrs. Kern, whose maiden name was Elmina Pickett, was born in Wisconsin. She had been a resident here 2½ years. She married Mr. Kern only a short time before his death a year or more ago. She was aged 65 years. By a former marriage there are seven surviving children: Mrs. Ruth Willer, this city; Bert Stearns, Ernest Stearns and Ray Stearns, Montana; Mrs. B. F. Hawley and Mrs. Alex Marvin, British Columbia. Mrs. Kern's mother, Mrs. A. Gillette of this city, also survives.

Arrangements for the funeral of Mrs. Smith and daughter are awaiting decision by Mr. Smith. Mrs. Smith's maiden name was Abbie Hedley. She was born in DeKalb county, Ind., and was aged 31 years. She was married in 1907.

Surviving Mrs. Smith, besides the husband, are a 14-year-old daughter, Lucille, who was visiting a neighbor at the time of the accident; the mother, Mrs. R. G. Elliott of this city, and two brothers, C. H. Hedley of Marshfield and Earl Hedley of Petoskey, Mich.
