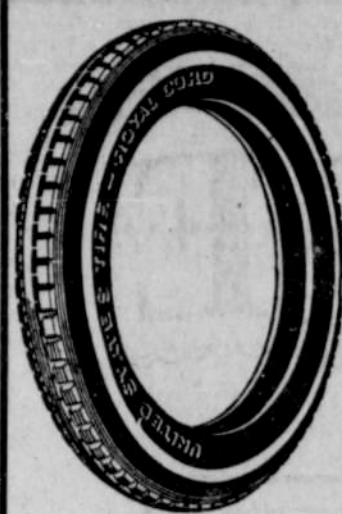

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Winter Sausage

IN SMALL towns and on farms when it is practical to make sausage at home, it is much more enjoyed than that bought at most markets. When preparing the meat for sausage, put it through the meat chopper three times, using the medium knife. As most sausage needs something to give it body, a cereal, like oatmeal, is liked. To prepare it put two quarts of water, one tablespoonful of salt into a saucepan; when boiling add one pint of oatmeal. Stir occasionally and cook one hour. Turn into a deep dish, add the meat and seasonings to taste.

Poultry dressing, sage for pork, celery leaves dried and rubbed fine, also parsley leaves are well liked with salt and pepper as usual.

Italian Sausage.—Take two cloves of garlic, six medium-sized onions chopped, two pounds of lean pork, one pound of fat pork; put through the meat chopper twice, then add the pint of cooked oatmeal as above, two tablespoonfuls of salt, the same of dried celery leaves, one tablespoonful of poultry dressing, one teaspoonful of black pepper and paprika to taste. Mix thoroughly and pack into five-inch casings. Plunge into boiling water, boil for one and one-half hours. Hang up to drain, and dry for a week or two. Then dip into melted paraffin and hang in a cold place till need.

Bologna Sausage.—Take two pounds of beef, one pound of fat pork, one-half pound of bacon, one clove of garlic, one medium-sized onion. Put the meat and seasoning through the meat chopper, then add the oatmeal as prepared. Mix well, add two tablespoonfuls of poultry dressing, two tablespoonfuls of salt, one teaspoonful of black pepper. Mix well, put through a colander. Pack into an eight-inch casing. Boil two hours, then cure as above.

Steamed Pudding.—Take one quart of bread crumbs, add milk to moisten, two well-beaten eggs, one and one-half cupsful of molasses, one cupful of currants, one pint of chopped apple, one-half teaspoonful of allspice, the same of cloves. Steam two hours and serve with a hot sauce.

Home Trade Merchants Will Buy Their Salesbooks From Their Home Print Shop—The Sentinel.

Lane County Officials Clear \$30,592 Deficit

Red Column Wiped Out And Auditor Has Praise For Officeholders.

Lane county cleaned up a deficit of \$30,592.68 during 1925 and ended the year with a balance in the treasury of \$27,079.15, according to the figures of the audit recently completed.

This data means, County Judge Barnard explained, that a total of \$57,671.83 was saved from expenditures during that period.

"We find all claims paid by warrants to have been properly authorized by the county court, said C. A. Horton, auditor, in submitting the report.

"The work being done by all county officials is of high character and exceptionally free from errors," he added.

Judge Barnard believes this to be the best record in the state. As a rule most counties fall short of the budget estimates and the year is ended with a deficit, as was the case here at the beginning of 1925.

The figures include only the general fund, it was pointed out, although this fund takes care of bond interest. Bonded indebtedness is aside from the budget income or disbursements.

Boosting Home Goods Talked by Merchants

Some Are Lax Is Claim, While Often Accusation Is Not Justifiable.

A lively discussion of methods of promoting home trade followed the regular business of Tuesday night's meeting of the Cottage Grove Credit association. That outside products are often shipped in when local products would be acceptable to the consumer, was the contention of several. That local merchants are often falsely charged with favoring outside products, especially those of the farm, was another contention. Several merchants present stated that preference is always given home-grown products when quality and price are equal and that often local producers expect local merchants to accept products that they would not think of attempting to sell elsewhere. Instances were related of producers who never failed to dispose of their product locally because it was brought to market in a condition that made it certain of resale.

A lively discussion followed a proposal that much trade could be kept at home if there could be exclusive stores for the sale of shoes and some other lines, thus making it possible for a much more complete stock to be carried. A committee was appointed to confer with a chamber of commerce committee for the purpose of endeavoring to work out something along this line. The discontinuance by some stores of dead or inactive lines was also referred to this committee.
