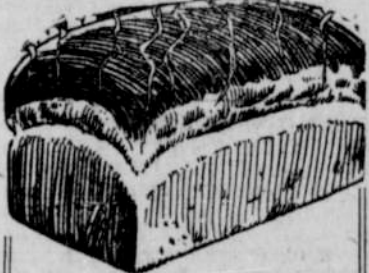

"When Two Strong Men Stand Face to Face"

True men recognize and respect one another, even through the mists of enmity. It is in warfare that we find the most striking illustration of that fact. Sir Frank Benson tells a delightful story of the sort which is quoted in Joseph H. Oldham's "Christianity and the Race Problem."

A British officer had been sent forward in some fighting with the Zulus, leading a contingent of men. The Zulus sent out a messenger of peace. By an unhappy blunder the British outposts shot him. The officer was greatly distressed. So he handed over the contingent to the second in command and walked straight out, unarmed, to the Zulu lines. He was led to the chief.

"I have come," he said, "to give myself up because we shot your peace messenger by mistake. It is a thing brave warriors never do. I am very sorry. To make amends I place my life in your hands; do what you will."

The Zulu warrior chief was silent for a moment. Then he said: "You are a man, and your people are men and the sons of men; we, too, are men. We will make peace." Youth's Companion.

Separation of Latin and Greek Churches

Apart from the theological discussions such as those arising from the addition of the words, "and the Son," in the creed, the separation of the Latin and Greek churches may be traced to the founding of Constantinople and the political division of the Roman empire. Ignatius, patriarch of Constantinople, had been deposed, and was succeeded by Photius, who summoned a Council of the East in 879, and passed a sentence of excommunication on the bishop of Rome. The church became divided toward the end of the Ninth century and remained so until the middle of the Eleventh century, when, in 1054, Michael Cerularius, patriarch of the East, renewed the condemnation of the Latin church, and was in turn excommunicated by Pope Leo IX. Efforts toward reunion were made from time to time, and at Ferrara (1439) the Greek prelates signed a decree of union, but were forced by the people and clergy to repudiate it. Since then the two communions have remained separate.

Wood for Newspaper

Since the customary units of wood measurement—cord, log measure or lumber scale—do not represent an exact quantity, the cubic foot solid wood is used. Even this unit is variable as to pulp yield according to the character of the wood as to species and rate of growth. However, taking the dry weight of spruce as 24 pounds per cubic foot, the commercial yield of 100 cubic feet would be about 2,300 pounds of mechanical pulp, and of sulphite pulp, 1,030 pounds. Commercially, news print is made from a mixture of 75 per cent mechanical and 25 per cent sulphite. Consequently a ton of newsprint would contain 1,500 pounds mechanical and 500 pounds sulphite. Then 1,500 pounds mechanical would require 66.2 cubic feet wood; 500 pounds sulphite would require 48.5 cubic feet wood; 1 ton of newsprint would require 118.7 cubic feet or 2,722.8 pounds oven dry spruce wood.

No Partner of the Devil

One time Servais Le Roy, the illusionist, was playing in Milwaukee. He ran out of rabbits—a serious situation for any magician. Le Roy found that an old German who lived outside of the city raised rabbits. He immediately went to the farm. The rabbits were there—plenty of them—and the required number was soon bought and paid for. Le Roy was so pleased that he pulled out a wad of his personal passes and wrote out one for the farmer and his wife. The German took one look at the pass and his eye fell upon a picture of a devil that adorned the slip of paper. Then he seized the rabbits and threw the most back in Le Roy's hands. He would have nothing to do with any transaction in which the devil was concerned.—Howard Thurston in Collier's.

Fish Marketed by Radio

Five minutes after a fish is caught in the North sea, a man sitting in a London office, 400 miles away, decides exactly where it will be eaten. All of the trawlers belonging to a big London fishing corporation are now equipped with wireless, and a report of every big catch is flashed to the London office so that marketing machinery starts working at once. Sometimes the fish are advertised in the London market before they are on the way to port. Fish that are rarely caught arrive just in time to be prepared and served for special occasions for which they have been booked.

Dog Trainers Differ in Methods of Work

Most dog trainers deny the truth of the saying that you can't teach old dogs new tricks. The fact appears to be that a dog more than two years old is more easily taught than the average puppy because he is more capable of understanding what you wish him to do.

Many an intelligent dog is spoiled by too insistent efforts to correct minor faults in the early stages of his training. His spirit is broken before he has an opportunity to learn things worth while. Many dog trainers, in handling hunting dogs, or even watch-dogs, insist that they should not be taught little tricks, such as sitting up and begging for food, or jumping through one's hands. The objection is that the trick dog comes to look for signals from his master and is less likely to act on his own initiative. On the other hand, many trainers take an opposite view, and think that learning tricks is good discipline and helps in a dog's general mental development.—Fred C. Kelly, in Hearst's International Cosmopolitan.
