## MASONRY IS ANCIENT BELIEVES PROF. HORNER

An interesting and entertaining lecture on the holy lands, with particular reference to the early history of Masonry, was given before the local Masonic lodge last evening by Professor J. B. Horner of Oregon Agricultural college. The address was illustrated with pictures taken by Professor Horner during his travels. These told better than the spoken work of the achievements of men who lived thousands of years ago and left inscriptions and marks to indicate that they were members of an organization similar to the Masonic organization of today. On a wall of an unearthed building in Pompeii, which was buried 2000 years ago, Professor Horner found a plate upon which appeared many of the implements of modern Masonry. His travels in the Mediterranean countries convinced him that Masonry is fully as ancient as many of the stupendous monuments left by those who labored long before the time of the Savior.

Professor Horner was a guest of honor at a social following his lecture. In addition to his lecture, he entertained with poems by Bobby Burns and Joaquin Miller.
