them and paying for their education
have to be stimulated. If school
instruction is the necessity for their
battle with their world that the
younger ones tell us it is, the
necessity should provide the stimulus,
and they can hardly blame anyone
but themselves if they fail to
get all there is to get. Knowledge
can't be funneled into them,
regardless of how much professors
may stimulate them.Probably a remark this writer

of the school room, if it is to be

in school if the knowledge obtained
is not to be applied outside the

president of the University of
Oregon, earned his way through

Reed college, who has won an
award of \$1000 for an essay on therelation of chemistry to the nation-
al defense, has been helping to pay
his way through college by work-

KITCHEN
CUPBOARD

Dishes for Occasions

FOR the children's party these
little cakes will be enjoyed:
Come-Again.—Sift two cups of
flour with one-half teaspoonful of
salt, two teaspoonfuls of baking
powder. Add one cupful of chopped
raisins and pecans, mixed in equal
parts, and one cupful of brown sug-
ar. Beat one egg very light, add
one-half cupful of milk and stir
this into the dry ingredients. Last-
ly, stir in two tablespoonfuls of
butter. Drop by small teaspoonfuls
on a greased baking sheet; sift
over them a mixture of cinnamon
and sugar and bake in a hot oven.Children's Cake.—Melt one-third
of a cupful of butter; add two-
thirds of a cupful of molasses,
three-quarters of a cupful of milk
and two eggs, well-beaten. Sift to-
gether two and one-half cups of
entire wheat flour, three quarters
of a teaspoonful of soda and one
teaspoonful of salt. Combine mix-
tures; add one cupful of seedless
raisins and turn into a well-buttered
melon mold. Cover and steam three
hours. The next day make a thick
icing, flavor with coffee. Have slices
of bread cut to represent the head
and tail of a turtle; place these in
position at the ends of the cake.
Melt a square of chocolate; add one
teaspoonful of butter and enough
boiling water to make a thin mix-
ture. Frost the cake; then, with a
small brush, dipped frequently into
the chocolate mixture, draw parallel
lines one inch apart and one-quarter
inch wide across the cake. With a
knife cut through the lines, follow-
ing the depressions made by the
mold. Paint the mouth and eyes
of the turtle with the chocolate.
Serve on an oblong platter.Orange Ice-Cream.—Strain two
and one-half cups of orange
juice; add one cupful of sugar and,
slowly, one cupful each of milk and
cream. Freeze as usual. Mold, if
desired, in individual molds and
garnish with candied orange peel.

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Tibetan Church Music
Charmed Sven HedinDr. Sven Hedin, the Swedish ex-
plorer, who was the first white man
to penetrate into the interior of
Tibet, has excited the curiosity of
musicians by his extravagant
praise of the church music of that
mysterious country. He claims that
he has visited no fewer than 81
temples in the land of the Grand
Lama, and that he found the music
of the "temple service" to be so
beautiful that he was spiritually
transported by it to regions super-
natural. He writes: "All through
Tibet the life of these monks has
appealed to me and filled me with
delight beyond anything I can say.
The most delightful thing in all
Tibet is the church music. Fresh
young voices, softened by thick,
dark draperies along the front of
an open gallery, pour forth their
wonderful hymns, full of peace and
love and longing. Between whis-
pers you hear the rumble of thunder of
the bassoons and the rhythmic
clash of the cymbals; then the
flutes with their shrill melodies and
the rolling drums, which echo
through the high halls of the tem-
ples. But the singing is by far the
most beautiful; it carries one up
and away from the troubles of this
earth."—Pierre van Passen, in the
Atlanta Constitution.Long List of Injuries
Result of AccidentsExamples of disease resulting
from particular accidental condi-
tions most frequently found in the
experiences of the compensation
commission are accidents to the
head or spine resulting in epilepsy,
nervous or mental disease, or in-
sanity; serious fracture or shock
resulting in traumatic pneumonia;
severe trauma or severe burns or
extreme exposure to cold and wet,
resulting in nephritis; injuries to
the eye resulting in cataract, de-
tachment of the retina, optic atro-
phy, and numerous other diseases
of the eye; sprain or fracture of
dislocation, or blow resulting in
arthritis, neuritis, cellulitis, synov-
itis, periorbitis, osteomyelitis, or tu-
berculosis of the bones; serious in-
jury to the chest with traumatic
pneumonia; injury with tuberculo-
sis of a bone or joint; injury with
severe infection, or severe injury
from inhalation of gas resulting in
tuberculosis of the lungs.

"The Beggar's Opera"

"The Beggar's Opera" was the
first musical play presented on the
American stage. It was written by
John Gay, and was produced at the
Nassau Street theater, New York,
174 years ago, January 14, 1761. A
large proportion of the 10,000 peo-
ple then comprising the population
of New York attended the perfor-
mance, although there were not a few
who protested against "the godless
affair" and threatened "to have the
law" on it. The Murray and Keene
company, a band of comedians who
came to New York from Philadel-
phia, were responsible for the pro-
duction, which was a benefit per-
formance for Thomas Keene, who
personally called on the leading citi-
zens and sold tickets. The per-
formance began at 6 o'clock and
was over at 8:15. One of the lines
from this light opera was, "How
happy could I be with either, were
I either dear charmer away."—Chi-
cago Journal.

History of Locks

The history of civilization could
be written from a study of its locks
and keys, for since the barred gate
of Eden problems of inclusion and
exclusion have concerned mankind.
Egyptians and Greeks were adepts
at lock-making; the Spartans
wrought an improvement of which
the description is lost. It is a his-
toric fact that the downfall of the
Roman empire gave a marked im-
petus to the manufacture of wards
and bolts, for Rome had policed
the world and thieves were encour-
aged by the disappearance of the
strong-armed authority which they
had feared. It is singular, in view
of the prevalence of padlocks in of-
ficial employment today, that the
derivation of the first syllable of
the name is uncertain. Webster
says that it may have meant a bas-
ket or pannier.

Legion of Honor Origin

The Legion of Honor, the famous
French order, was instituted by
Napoleon Bonaparte when he was
first consul, May 19, 1802. Although
this order confers honors upon dis-
tinguished civil servants of the
state and eminent benefactors of
humanity, it is provided that three-
fifths of all the medals awarded
must go to the officers and men of
the army and navy. During the
World war thousands of the medals
of the legion were awarded to sol-
diers and public servants. There
are now five classes, the Grand
cross being the highest.
Many American and British citi-
zens received the medal of the Le-
gion of Honor, and immediately
after the war it was also conferred
upon the military leaders of the
allies of France.

Rich Fishing Ground

The bureau of fisheries says that
the fish fauna of the New England
coast is one of the richest and most
varied in American waters. About
150 species have been recorded from
this area, and the host of commer-
cial species includes representatives
of the most important world fishes,
such as cod, haddock, hake, pollock
and related species; the sea herring,
mackerel, swordfish, halibut, found-
ers, salmon, etc. The outlying
bank fisheries extending to the
northeast represent the most im-
portant fishing area in the Americas.
American fishing vessels alone an-
nually catch about 200,000,000
pounds of sea foods from this area.

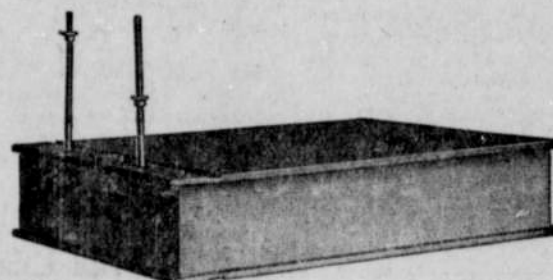

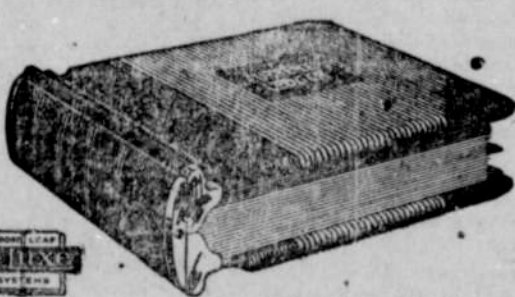
