Doughnut Revealed as Poison Gas Producer

The only trouble it has ever caused, according to the best authorities, is some controversial friction on the question of resemblance to the cruller. Some have contended that a doughnut is not a doughnut at all, but the true cruller, while the cruller is only the doughnut without the hole. Now it turns out that the doughnuts has suddenly committed murder by an unsuspected capacity to produce poison gas. For the sake of the merest fragment of belief that there are still harmless and innocent things in the world, it is to be hoped that this doughnut story may prove to have been exaggerated.—Exchange.

Eyes Need Extra Care

When Lights Are Poor

Autumn and winter months are trying where artificial light is not of the best. The eyes need great care if they are to remain in good condition under the strain.

If the eyes give any definite trouble an oculist should, of course, be consulted at once. But a simple home treatment will not only act as an efficient "refresher," but will also rid the eyes of all harmful secretions of dust. Make a solution of boracic powder (about one teaspoonful to a pint of boiling water), leave to cool, bottle and cork tightly. Use this in an eye-bath which can be bought of a druggist.

Night and morning give the eyes a good "bath," using a fresh bathful of the solution for each eye. Once you have started the treatment you will find it so beneficial that you will continue all the year round, much to the improvement of your eyes.

A Meal in One Dish.

Much of the work of meal getting consists in watching various things that are cooking at the same time. A good way to avoid this "three-ring circus" strenuousness is by cooking several of the staple foods together in the same dish. Here is one delicious combination: Have the butcher trim most of the fat from a round steak and lay the steak in a casserole of sufficient size. Sprinkle flour, salt and pepper over it, then a layer of sliced onions, more flour, salt and pepper, then some canned tomatoes and canned peas, more flour and seasoning, and finally cover the whole with water. Cover and cook in the oven, slowly and thoroughly, allowing from an hour and a half to two hours. With this dish, one needs to serve only baked potatoes—which can be baked while the meat dish is cooking—to have a well-rounded meal with very little trouble.

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

Good Puddings

AT THIS season of the year rich puddings and sauce are enjoyed.

Suet Pudding.—Take one cupful each of suet, chopped fine, molasses and sour milk. Beat two eggs, add to the milk, mix with suet and molasses and add three and one-half cupfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of soda, one cupful of raisins and currants mixed and spices to taste. Steam two hours. Serve with:

Egg Sauce.—Beat the white of an egg until stiff, add the yolk and beat again, one cupful of powdered sugar, a pinch of salt, one teaspoonful of vanilla, and just before serving a cupful of rich hot milk.

Prune Pudding.—Soak and remove the stones after cooking from one pound of prunes. Cut up, add one pint of coarse bread crumbs, one cupful of sugar, one-half cupful of butter, one-fourth cupful of molasses, three eggs, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful of cloves, one-half teaspoonful of soda dissolved in one tablespoonful of milk. Mix and steam three hours.

Prune Pudding.—Take one cupful of choice prunes, soak overnight, mince fine, add three stiffly beaten egg whites, one cupful of sugar; pile into a well-buttered baking dish and bake in a slow oven. Serve at once with cream.

Baked Indian Pudding.—Moisten one cupful of corn meal with one cupful of sweet milk and stir into one quart of scalding milk with one teaspoonful of salt. Cook ten minutes, then add one cupful of suet, one-half cupful of brown sugar, one-fourth cupful of molasses, two eggs and a cupful of raisins. Add another quart of milk and pour into a deep earthen dish and bake for four hours. Stir well every fifteen minutes for the first hour, then sprinkle the top of the pudding with flour to form a brown crust with the suet and continue baking until thoroughly browned. This pudding may be reheated and served to the last tablespoonful and will be good as long as it lasts. Serve hot with hard sauce.
