Royal Stubbornness

Use for Gyroscopes

When first invented the gyroscope, then called 'rotoscope,' was used as a scientific toy to illustrate the dynamics of rotating bodies, the composition of rotations, etc. A delicately mounted form of the above apparatus, invented by M. Foucault, is used to render visible the rotation of the earth on account of the tendency of the rotating wheel to preserve a constant plane of rotation, independently of the earth's motion. This same principle is made use of in an instrument invented by Dr. H. Anschultz-Kampfe, designed to replace the mariner's compass or to serve as a check upon its accuracy. Other uses of the gyroscope are as a steering apparatus, and as a balancing device in certain flying machines, and in a proposed type of monorailway.

First English Theater

The mansions of the great were built upon the river bank—hence the name of the street: Strand. Steps led to the water and gay barges carried the "quality-folk" across the river, the ladies frequently masked to escape rudeness and jest.

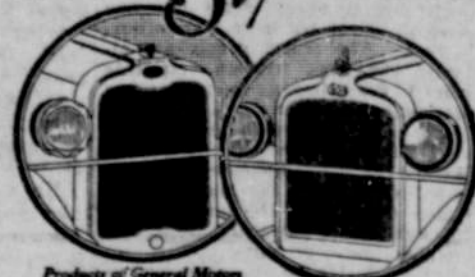
