Found Empty Coffin in "Tomb" of Monarch

One of the most amazing of royal mysteries was recalled by the celebration of the supposed centenary of the Czar Alexander I of Russia.

After Alexander's "death" on November 18, 1825, it was rumored that an empty coffin had been lowered into the earth in the imperial burial place, and that the czar was spending the evening of his days in prayer and contemplation. Popular belief, indeed, identified a hermit, calling himself Kuzmitch, with the late monarch. Kuzmitch, whose past life was a complete mystery, appeared about this time in the depths of the Siberian forest. He was frequently visited by the Czar Nicholas I, who treated him with the most profound respect.

If Kuzmitch were really Alexander I, he carried his secret with him to the grave. But a new turn was given to speculation on the subject of the czars when the tombs of the czars were opened by order of the Soviet authorities. The original seals on the coffin of Alexander I were still intact, but when it was opened there was nothing in it but a few lumps of lead.

Two Conflicts Known as "Battle of Spurs"

The Battle of Spurs is a name given to two engagements widely separated in point of time. The first battle was fought at Courtrai in Flanders, in 1302 between the nobles and the burghers. The knights and gentlemen of France were entirely overthrown by the citizens of a Flemish (or Belgian) manufacturing town. The French nobles roared with loose bridles and fell headlong into an enormous ditch which lay between them and their enemy. The whole army of these nobles and gentry was annihilated, and when the spoils were gathered there were found 4,000 golden spurs to mark the extent of the knightly slaughter, and give a name to the engagement.

The second engagement to which had been given the name, the Battle of Spurs, was the affair at Guinegate, near Calais, France, in 1513, in which the English troops under Henry VIII defeated the French forces. The allusion to spurs is said to be to the unusual energy of the beaten troops in riding off the field of battle. They made good use of their spurs.

Newspaper Printing

Rotary presses, which are used by most large newspapers today, print from curved plates fixed on cylinders, which are constantly revolving and constantly printing. They are not fed with single sheets, but with a long web of paper, the press itself cutting off the desired length of sheet from the reel, either before or after the printing is completed. Practically all these presses have folding attachments which deliver the paper folded and ready for delivery. The simplest form has four cylinders, two for the stereo plates and two to give the impression, but as newspapers have grown in size it has been necessary to add one, two or three rows of cylinders above the first set.

Radio for the Deaf

It depends entirely upon the type of deafness and the degree to which it is developed whether a radio can be of assistance. Persons who are entirely deaf or nearly so cannot be aided by this instrument, but successful results have been obtained by persons whose hearing is partially affected. The reason lies in the fact that when the ear phones are used the sounds are greatly magnified, which enables them to distinguish sounds more readily. The instrument can be tuned to such a degree as to make the incoming sounds very loud, in fact, a great deal louder than the speaking voice or other sounds.

How Nice

His Son Was Smart

Ohio's First Sawmill Located at Marietta

Ohio's first sawmill was built at Marietta in 1789. The crank, weighing 180 pounds, was made in New Haven, Conn., and taken by "pack horse" over the mountains to Simrals Ferry on the Youghiogheny river, and thence by water, says the Antiquarian.

The mill near Colebrook was of great importance to the settlers. It was on a small stream, and had an overshot wheel. Logs were converted into boards, and the long-tailed-of "frame" house could be built.

The mail was sent and brought by runners. "Through" mail was carried in a small bag with a key, designated by a wooden tag attached to it, and the "way" mail was tied to a handkerchief. The post boy "ran" the mail at first on foot—then on horseback.

When their fields were cleared, flax was sown that these pioneers might weave, on their handmade looms, linen and cloth materials with which to clothe themselves.

We wonder at, and revere, the persistent diligence of these forefathers of ours; for they seem to have had no time nor inclination to be indolent or inactive.

Obligation and Right Constitute Legal Tie

An obligation in law is defined as "a legal tie that binds us to another, either to give him something, to do, or abstain from doing some act." For instance, an agreement or contract of sale creates a legal tie between two parties, the seller being obliged to deliver the thing sold and warrant it, and the buyer being obliged to pay the price. In ordinary use obligation has a different meaning from right. A person is obliged to do that which he can be compelled by law to do, but a right commonly means something that one can compel others to do. For instance, it would not be correct to say that a landowner has a right to build half the line fence. He is obliged—under legal obligation—to build half of such fence, and he has the right to compel the adjoining owner to fulfill his obligation and build the other half. Generally speaking, obligation and right are the opposite ends of the legal tie, the obligation of one party being the right of the other. The noun obligation, and the verb, obligate, are from the Latin verb, obligo, I bind.

Parliamentary Term

The parliamentary clerk of the house of representatives says that as a matter of fact there is no minority passage of a bill in either branch of congress, but the phrase in all probability refers to the fact that legislation may be passed by a majority vote of the members present, if a quorum is present. Very often a measure will be passed by a majority of the members present, which number is not a majority of the members elected. For example, a majority of the membership of the house is 218, but in the event only 300 members are present during the vote on the passage of the bill the vote would be 151 to 149, and the bill would be passed by a majority. This does not mean that a minority passes the bill, because it is presumed that those that are absent acquiesce in the action taken by a majority of those present.

Original Gold Pens

Gold was first used in the making of pen points in the United States in 1835. Soon it was found necessary to harden the points of these pens, and this was done by protecting them with diamonds or rubies, which made the pens very costly and consequently very rare. John Hawkins, to whom is due the discovery that an alloy of iridium and osmium soldered on to the gold would serve the purpose just as well as the gem stones and at much less cost, was the first to use iridium. In 1850 his method was superseded and for the first time iridium was fused with the gold and a much stronger and a more durable pen-point was produced. Over 100,000 pens are manufactured every year by one firm alone.

"Gadzooks," Indian Oath

A Hyatt Verill, a collector for the Museum of American Indians, has discovered that "gadzooks," supposed an oath of the good old Elizabethan days in England, is used commonly by the Panama Indians. The reason is that the oath was carried to the tribe by the English expedition known as Bartholomew Sharp's buccaneers, in 1600. This expedition left also a number of other English words that have been appropriated and corrupted by the Panama tribes which came into contact with the newcomers at the time.
