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THE SENATORSHIP.

While The Sentinel has not espoused the cause of Senator Stanfield in his candidacy for re-nomination, and while it criticized him because of a recent incident in eastern Oregon, yet it does not believe his opponents are dealing entirely fair with him.

No new member of the senate can immediately take the place now held by Stanfield. The opportunity is not now present to rise to a position of influence as quickly as Stanfield did. It is unfair to say that Stanfield has been idle when the interests of his state and of his constituents were at stake.

Anyone who wins his way to the senate by belittling the efforts of Stanfield and by claiming that Stanfield has not been alert to the interests of his state will have a hard job cut out for himself in trying to even equal what Stanfield has done.

Other candidates may be more desirable. Other candidates may be such as we prefer to have represent us in our country's highest legislative body, but we should be fair in our estimate of what our officials do for us. Those who criticize Stanfield now and call him an idler, if they should succeed in defeating him, are likely to be complaining in the near future about unfair criticism hurled at them, criticism that would be no more unfair than that directed at Stanfield now.

Stanfield can accomplish as much at Washington in the next six years as any man we can send there. Whether he is otherwise the kind of a man we want, whether or not he could successfully defend himself against a campaign of mud-slinging that would be certain to follow his nomination are the points for the voter to decide.

There are other candidates whom The Sentinel believes to be first class senatorial timber. The republican party is fortunate in the

class of its candidates for this office.

Should one of Stanfield's opponents be nominated and elected, the chances are that six years from now The Sentinel will be found defending him against the same kind of unfair and unjust criticism to which Stanfield is now being subjected.
